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

News from the Spanish Front

HE following is a revealing letter from our Elim Missionaries, Pastor and Mrs. G. Thomas, showing a little of the terrible conditions in Spain at the present time. The letter takes the form of a diary of events covering a period of fourteen days. We rejoice that God has preserved His servants in the midst of the perils that surrounded them.—ED.

Gibraltar.
4th August, 1936.

Saturday, 18th July. The Fascists have declared a revolution throughout Spain, the military leaders being the prime movers in the revolt.

Sunday, 19th. Here in Ronda last night the military chiefs in declaring the State of Alarm killed a civilian and wounded a captain and a corporal. The dead man was taken to the cemetery at four o'clock this morning; four mounted Civil Guards accompanied the funeral.

The workers have taken possession of the town and are searching the houses of the better-class people, and are taking possession of all firearms. They have discovered a large quantity and are distributing them among the workers who are determined to resist any attempt to take the town from outside.

Numbers of Fascists have been imprisoned. We thought it advisable to suspend the service to-night. There is no communication with the outside world and the only news we hear is the little that comes over the wireless and this appears very unreliable.

Monday, 20th. Armed workers are patrolling the streets, some with modern rifles, others with double-barrel guns, shot-guns and revolvers; those who have no firearms carry stout sticks. One of the Roman Catholic churches has been completely destroyed by fire and the images have been taken out of all the others and piled up on the streets and burned. Not a member of the regular police is to be seen on the streets, the workers are in complete possession.

This evening the first train in three days arrived, but it was a special train bringing a large number of armed workers into Ronda from other towns and villages. These marched in order from the station through the streets with red and black banners flying.

We went for a short walk in the cool of the evening—it has been hot indoors all day—but heard the reports of rifle fire and saw men running not far away, so we returned home again. To-night the sky is lit up with the flames from a burning church.

The houses of our neighbours have been again searched for firearms, but up to the present they have not come to our house.

Tuesday, 21st. This morning while at breakfast we were startled by the sudden loud reports of rifle fire right outside our house and thought that the workers were firing at our neighbours, but it proved to be a funeral procession of a worker who had been accidentally killed during the night and his comrades were firing a salute into the air.

This evening on returning to our house after a short walk we saw two workers with rifles raised and pointed to the upstairs windows of our next-door neighbours; there were other workers inside the house making another search for firearms.

Wednesday, 22nd. The fifth day of the revolution. We are still cut off from the outside world. There are no trains, no newspapers nor mail; the little news we get is that which comes over the radio.

This morning there was some excitement when a rumour spread abroad that the Moorish soldiers from Spanish Morocco, under the command of a rebel Spanish General were marching on Ronda. Numbers of workers armed with rifles left in motor trucks to investigate and intercept the supposed approaching rebels.

The workers have commandeered the motor cars and trucks in the town, irrespective of who are the owners, and are using them to convey the armed workers from one place to the other.

We were disturbed during the night by rifle fire near the house and later learned that one of the workers had been shot by some of his own comrades as he failed to give the required sign.

Thursday, 23rd. The servants employed in the houses have been ordered to leave their employ so that

their employers might be obliged to do their own work and go to the market and shops for what they need. Thus we see the unusual sight of proud Spaniards going to the market with baskets in their hands.

Went to the telegraph office with the intention of sending a message to Headquarters, but telegrams could not be sent beyond the limits of this province of Malaga.

Friday, 24th. Workers from Ronda went in a motor truck to the village of El Burgo to bring here a number of Fascists. For some reason they stopped on the way and it is said that some of the Fascists attempted to escape. The workers shot and killed nine of the Fascists. It is to this village that we have been going once a week to conduct meetings.

Saturday, 25th. Heard this morning that two Roman Catholic priests were killed here last night.

While on the street this morning saw a number of cars and trucks loaded with armed workers returning from a distant village that had been held by the Fascists. The workers had taken the village, killing two Civil Guards and taking two others prisoners.

Learned this morning that all the British subjects in Ronda had left with the exception of one young man and he was waiting instructions from his firm and was also anxious to leave. It appears that the British Consul at Malaga sent two cars to this town to convey all the British subjects to the former place, but for some reason we were forgotten and the cars returned to Malaga with the Britishers and we did not learn about it until the day following.

To-night we heard shooting behind the house and a little later learned that two young men, brothers, and Fascists, who had fled a week previous, tried to enter the town under cover of darkness but were discovered. The workers who discovered them gave orders that they were to walk in front and immediately were shot

from the back and killed.

During the night we heard more shooting.

Sunday, 26th. A number of men, said to be Fascists or in sympathy with them, have been killed here during the night.

We had a breaking of bread service here in the house this morning, a few of the believers came together for this. It is good to know the Lord as our Refuge and Hiding-place at times like the present.

Sent a telegram to the British Consul at Malaga, asking him to advise Headquarters and our people that we are safe.

Monday, 27th. We were awakened during the early hours of the morning by the noise of shooting near and heard the bullets whizzing past the house. This continued for some time and, looking through the window, saw a number of men armed with rifles looking for someone who had apparently escaped. Later we heard more shooting and saw large numbers of men passing on their way to the place where the shooting had been. There was a continuous stream of people passing and this aroused our suspicions and we learned later that a large number of Fascists had been shot. Later I went to the cemetery to where the dead bodies had been taken and saw the grusome sight of a pile of dead bodies covered with blood piled one on top of

the other in utter disorder as though they had been thrown there as so much rubbish. The majority of the dead men had a growth of beard and were dressed in blue overalls. They were supposed Fascists and had been put in gaol at the outbreak of the trouble and this morning at dawn were taken out of prison and conveyed in cars just outside the town and there shot and killed. The gaping holes in their heads and faces showed how they had died from the shots of the rifles. There were forty-six of these men, members of the middle and upper classes, some being from the wealthiest families in the town. There were cases of father and son being shot together, also brothers and cousins.

Orders to-day declare that food can be obtained only on the presentation of tickets issued by the Food Committee.

Have just heard that some cars are leaving this afternoon for Malaga where there is a British warship in the harbour waiting to take British subjects on board, so we have decided to leave Ronda if possible. Went to the Communist mayor for a permit to travel along the road to Malaga and to pass the pickets who are on guard along the way. While in the mayor's office messages were coming through asking for help for the neighbouring villages to meet the rebel soldiers

who were approaching. After three hours' continuous rushing about we are able to leave but have no time to wish the believers goodbye as the car is waiting at the door and the people are anxious to be away. We are able to take just a suitcase each. It is with sad hearts and tears that we have to leave. All along the way we are being held up by groups of workers armed with ancient and modern firearms. These groups have placed trees or carts across the road so that it is impossible to pass until we have given the necessary sign and presented our papers which are carefully examined. While this is going on other workers peep at us with pointed rifles from behind well-prepared barricades. Arrived at Malaga after ten o'clock at night and found a place to stay overnight.

Tuesday, 28th. Malaga. The workers are in control here as in Ronda and have commandeered the cars and trucks which they are using to advantage. Day and night cars and trucks filled with armed workers rush along the streets. On the first night of the revolution the military attempted to take control of the city, but the workers, realising what was happening, rose up and resisted the soldiers. It is said that the soldiers had been deceived by their officers and when they discovered the fact, deserted their leaders and joined hands with the workers. The Fascists and those in sympathy with them shot at the workers from the windows of their houses and shops and for about five hours a fierce battle raged in the streets. The workers, angered at being shot at from the buildings, took a drastic step and set fire to the shops and houses of those who opposed them. The main business street of Malaga, which boasted many fine business houses and shops of four and five stories, is almost completely destroyed by fire, and all that remains are the bare, charred walls. In other streets also buildings have been completely destroyed by fire, while in one of the residential districts a large number of beautiful homes have been laid in ruins. The loss and damage in Malaga alone must amount to millions of pounds.

Saw the British Consul; he said there is a British warship standing by and for us to keep in touch with him and in a day or two we will leave for Gibraltar.

An aeroplane from the rebel forces passed over here this morning and dropped bombs, killing two men and

injuring others.

Wednesday, 29th. Three Roman Catholic priests were shot and killed here this morning. A rebel aeroplane again passed over here and dropped bombs, some falling near the warships in the harbour.

Thursday, 30th. Saw some Spanish people who have just arrived from Ronda. They have come away as conditions are getting worse. There have been more people killed in Ronda, including a brother of one of our believers. Among those who have come away is the family of the mayor and a town councillor, who a few days ago told me there was no danger in Ronda.

Friday, 31st. At nine o'clock this morning we as= sembled at the British Consulate with others who are anxious to leave Spain. Before going on board we had to present our passports to the Spanish authorities, proving our British citizenship, as many Spaniards are trying to escape to Gibraltar.

At twelve o'clock we got on board H.M.S. Destroyer Bulldog. The officers and crew had prepared for our arrival, placing seats and chairs on deck and bringing us soup and sandwiches. There were fiftytwo of us, refugees, including British people, British subjects, and those of other nationalities. We reached Gibraltar at about six o'clock in the evening and are glad to be back under the British Flag once again.

World Events and their Significance

THE INCREASING POPULATION OF PALESTINE

GLANCE at figures which indicate the growth of some of the Palestinian towns within the past few years is most impressive.

During the past four years the Jewish population of Haifa has more than tripled, the increase being from 16,000 in 1931 to 50,000 in 1935 (212% increase). Tel Aviv's growth has been from 46,300 to 135,000 (192%) increase). In Jerusalem the increase in the Jewish population has been much smaller, the figures revealing that this has gone from 53,800 to 71,000 (32%).

IF WAR SHOULD COME

We are given to understand that "if war should be declared to-day, Russia would have more men and more planes at her command than any other nation The Soviet Republic boasts a standing in Europe. army of 1,300,000, reserves of 7,000,000 and an air fleet of 3,000 planes. Italy ranks second in Europe, with a standing army of 1,200,000, which is far above normal strength due to the conflict with Ethiopia, reserves of 5,800,000 and an air fleet of 1,500 planes. Germany's standing army numbers 650,000, her reserves total 1,400,000, but her air strength is kept secret. France has 600,000 men in her standing army, slightly more than one million reserves and 2,500 planes. Her air fleet is second to that of Russia. Great Britain's standing army of 400,000, her reserves of 5,000,000, and her air fleet of 1,100 planes places that nation last, from a standpoint of readiness for

We cannot but tremble at the thought of all this fearful machinery of war being let loose upon the world. This all intensifies the cry for the coming of the Lord as the remedy for the world's unrest.

THE ATTITUDE OF THE MODERN JEW TO JESUS

It is exceedingly interesting to discover the attitude that modern Judaism is taking towards Christ. One writer of considerable experience points out

that there are now but a negligible few who deny the historicity of Christ. Unlike those of the past who pronounced Jesus a blasphemer, or impostor, the modern educated Jew sees in Him a noble and magnetic personality,

a defender of the common people. They claim that He never intended to start a new religion, but was a devoted follower of traditional Judaism and those who persecuted Him were wrong in doing so. They deny all responsibility of the Jews in the guilt of His death. This is practically the Modernist viewpoint.

One Jewish writer in telling of the erratic change in the Jewish attitude says the old, firm Jewish traditions are melting away like snow in the sun. To-day not only is Jesus discussed by liberal Jews, but He is a topic for discussion even in the heart of the ghetto. Jesus has become the most fascinating figure, "the man who became Godlike."

It is most natural that the Jews should find themselves in practical sympathy with Modernist "Christians." On the other hand their persecution for more than 15 centuries has been largely at the hands of those who professed to believe in Jesus as "God manifest in the flesh." This has added oil to the flames of hatred and prejudice. Those who have claimed to stand for the New Testament revelation have gone so far as to commit unspeakable crimes against the They have been compelled in some countries to wear degrading badges to designate them as Christ-killers. centuries this sort of thing has been done in France, Germany, Spain, England, Russia, Poland, etc. It is not easy to overcome the deep-seated prejudice due to the attitude of those who were Christian in name only. A present-day obstacle is the fact that there are professed leaders of orthodoxy in the ranks of Jew-baiters.

Thus before we can make a beginning of breaking down their modernistic viewpoint to reveal Christ to them as "the Lamb of God" and the "Son of God," we must by patience and kindness show the Jew that oppression and persecution have nothing in common with Christ or Christianity, that his enemies who revealed only hate and perpetual evil deeds in Christ's name, misrepresented Him. "Let us not be weary in well doing" may well be taken as the motto of those who would win a Jew to Christ. The formidable wall which separates the Jew from Jesus CAN bedemolished by loving and tactful effort on the part of true Christians.

The masses of Jewry stand confused and waiting for light. They see that for 19 centuries they have blindly followed their leaders and it is now proven that their whole account of Jesus was utter nonsense,

THE BIBLE IN CHINA

Since the publication of the first Chinese New Testament 120 years ago the total circulation of the Chinese Scriptures by the British and Foreign Bible Society exceeds 106,000,000 copies. Thus the light of divine revelation is penetrating the darkness of heathendom. Those words of which Jesus said, "They are spirit and they are life," are finding their way into the hands of the millions that sit in the shadow of death, and who dwell in pagan bondage.

THE GOSPEL IN RUSSIA

A Christian believer who was in Russia in 1935 gives an interesting account of his visit to a gospel service in Moscow. He says

On Sunday morning I decided to look for a Christian church. After looking around I found a Russian Gospel Christian Church. The building was quite large and when I arrived I saw it was overcrowded with people. were outside trying to push their way in. The service lasted several hours and when the benediction was pronounced the minister told the people to scatter to their homes as soon as possible. They are not permitted to talk with their friends after services as we commonly do in this country. I wanted to speak with the minister but because of the crowd I could not get inside, so after the service I waited until the people had cleared away. It took ten minutes perhaps until I could easily get in. I introduced myself and we had wonderful fellowship together. Then this brother asked me to come to the evening service. He told me to come at least half an hour earlier if I wanted a seat in the front.

That evening when I came an hour ahead of time I found the church already crowded. Every seat was taken, but the brother who had invited me saved a chair and when I came in he handed it to me from the platform.

Now let me tell you what I saw and experienced in that service that night. When the clock struck seven the minister got up and announced a song. You should hear the voices ring out in singing, every believer taking part. Since there were not many song books most of the people sang from memory. After the service I took the pains to inquire what time the people came to church and why they came so early. The answer given me was this, that ministers in Russia are allowed to preach the Gospel but are not allowed to give an altar call. So the members and others come ahead of time to do personal work among There is a lack of Bibles, Testaments, and song books, but nevertheless I saw how those believers quoted verses and chapters from the Bible and even stanzas from songs, explaining them to the unsaved. I saw how many listened, wept and prayed, asking God to forgive them their sins. The minister does not have to ask them to give their hearts to Christ, because after the Word is preached they go and ask him what they must do in order to be saved or to live a better Christian life.

Persecution still continues in Russia, and many of the Lord's people are being exiled, but there are numbers who still witness for the Lord everywhere they can in spite of the sufferings involved. We rejoice

SCENES OF ENTHUSIASM AT HALIFAX


Principal Jeffreys Addressed Crowded Building

HERE was a big crowd present, last night, when Elim Tabernacle, the new headquarters of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Church, Halifax, was opened by Principal Jeffreys, of London, who founded the movement in 1915.

The new premises, formerly Hanover Methodist Sunday School, have been entirely redecorated, and many structural alterations have been made. When Principal Jeffreys officially opened the main door, in

Bond Street, with a gilded key presented to him by Mrs. C. Richardson, one of the trustees, there must have been 1,000 people standing in the street, pressed together in a solid mass, and it was an impressive scene when hymns were sung in the street unaccompanied.

When the door was actually opened, there was a rush, so eager was everyone to get into the building. —Daily Courier and Guardian.

The Scripture Union Daily Portions: Meditations by Pastor J. SMITH

Sunday, Aug. 30th. Matt. xxi. 18-32. "But afterward he repented, and went" (verse 29).

I have frequently been confronted with people who at some time or other have firmly declared they would do, or would not do, certain things; and who later have found their mistake in making these declarations. Now that they have more light they see that to continue to hold on to what they said is contrary to the will of God. But the question arises: having said these things should they stick to what they said. Whose word is the more important to keep? God's Word or your own? If God shows you that you made a mistake in a certain thing, and to continue in your mistake is contrary to His will, then it is your duty to get into the will of God at once. Otherwise your righteousness becomes self-righteousness. "Let God be true, but every man a liar."

PRAYER TOPIC: That solemn consecration of life and service to God mark this day, and that many souls be added to the Church to-day.

Monday, Aug. 31st. Matt. xxi. 33-46.

" The stone which the builders rejected, the same is become the head of the corner" (verse 42).

It is a delightful Bible study to quietly survey the pathway of humanity and see all the stones which have been rejected of men, but have been chosen of God to occupy the most prominent, positions in His building. Such a study gives us encouragement, and causes us to despair of none. See how Joseph was despised by his brethren and sold by them as a slave, see how Moses was also rejected by his brethren and had to flee from his native country. See how Gideon and Jephthah were despised by the leaders of their day. And Israel's most famous king in the beginning of his career was hunted from pillar to post like a partridge. Very few of the prophets were honoured or recognised by the leading men of their day. Is it any wonder then that we find Jesus Christ and His followers in line with these world-rejected, but God-honoured, stars of glory. The world is still at the same old game: crucifying living saints and deifying dead saints.

PRAYER TOPIC: Heartfelt rejoicings for the marvellous way God has protected Pastor and Mrs. Thomas and Jewyl throughout their trying experiences in

Tuesday, Sept. 1st. Matt. xxii. 1-14. "Behold, I have prepared my dinner" (verse 4).

There is an important doctrinal truth brought out in this parable, which it is well to consider carefully. Those which before had been bidden and were now called were certainly the Jews; they refused to come, were rejected of God, and true to the prophecy in verse seven their city was burnt up and they were destroyed. Then the call went out to as many as they could find, and they came and sat down at the same feast which the Jews had rejected. Now answer this simple question: Which was changed, the feast or the guests? Do we read of a single dish being taken off the table? No, not one. Salvation for the soul. Healing for the body, the Baptism in the Spirit, the Gifts of the Spirit, and the Fruits of the Spirit, the Wine of Joy and the Water of Life were, and are, all there for whosoever will to come and partake: A real foursquare meal. Hallelujah!

PRAYER TOPIC: Elim's united prayer day for world-wide and national revival. That God may find in this Foursquare Gospel Movement a humble, holy people whose prayers will help to bring this

Wednesday, Sept. 2nd, Matt. xxii. 15-33. " In the resurrection they . . . are as the angels of God " (verse 30).

There is an important truth brought out in this verse concerning our future relationship one toward another. We are told that "Flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God." But a body of flesh and bones like our Lord had when He arose from the dead can inherit the kingdom of God. The truth here brought out is that the blood relationship drops in the grave. We will, of course, know our loved ones, but they will no longer bear the same relationship toward us as they did while on earth. We will be one great family, equally related one toward another, with one great Father and one wonderful Saviour, and one common Spirit permeating and filling all our bodies with the same divine life. No need of blood ties, the Spirit tie will be quite sufficient; and even here we get a foretaste of that relationship which sometimes becomes stronger than even that of blood, PRAYER TOPIC:

If this is the first and great commandment then it is more important than any of the others, and it should in consequence receive more attention than any of the others. To break this commandment must be the greatest sin. Let us look at some of the indications of love: We enjoy being in the society of those we love, we enjoy the very society of their true friends, we are pleased to converse about them, we are pleased to hear from them, we are happy to think about them, we are pained to be separated from them, we are grieved to hear an evil report of them, and refuse to give it publicity. These are but some of the indications of love. Are these things true of our love toward the Lord and toward His people? Love counts service a joy, almost a gratification, love knows no sacrifice, love makes a light heart. " Follow after love."

PRAYER TOPIC:
That the World Crusade meeting in Crystal Palace on Saturday increase prayer-power around the work of God at home and overseas.

"The scribes and the Pharisees sit in Moses' seat " (verse 2).

In spite of the scathing remarks of our Lord regarding the life and manners of the Scribes and Pharisees, yet He fully recognised their position, and taught men to respect the same. They were strict Fundamentalists and gloried in it. It was not so much their teaching to which our Lord took exception, but their hypocrisy. Our Lord was no stirrer up of strife and revolution, He always respected law and authority, and taught others to do likewise. He was the Sun of Righteousness, but the Pharisees felt their pride cut to the quick as they endeavoured with their little night lights to contest His claims. No need to push them off the earth, they had been necessary for a time, but now they should have recognised the dawn of the day they had so long looked for; alas that bitterness and prejudice had blinded their eyes. PRAYER TOPIC:

For God's overshadowing on those travelling by rail or road or sea to Crystal Palace Demonstration to-morrow and for fine weather.

Saturday, Sept. 5th. Matt. xxiii. 23-39. " Fill ye up then the measure of your fathers " (verse 32).

Some of these very prophets whose sepulchres they garnished had been slain because they denounced this very thing: shrine worship, and now that they were dead, the world pursuing its old course: crucifying living saints and deifying dead ones, was now committing the very same sin as their fathers, in garnishing the sepulchres of these men. The traveller meets with this thing at every turn in Palestine: see the spirit in which they guard the so-called sacred places; how they would murder you on the very spot if you stood up and denounced the sins of those would-be worshippers, as the prophets did, whose bones lie guarded there. What horrible scenes have taken place in the church of the Holy Sepulchre because one party has overstayed their time in prayer, what bloodshed, what free fights between the so-called worshippers. No wonder our Lord was sick of the whole business and denounced it. How He must have longed for the time when the true worshippers would worship the Father in spirit and in truth.



The Principal's colossal subject on "Prophecy" is handled with searching forcefulness made all the more searching, because of the gentle tolerance displayed in the setting out of the different aspects of truth, proclaimed by students of the Word on this very subject One could feel deeply conscious that the speaker (who pleaded for tolerance where fundamentals were sound) was not so much bent on getting men and women to accept any pet theory held dear by him. The pathos of his pleading centred around solemn facts in Bible prophecy which world events had turned into history, and which proclaimed the unmistakable authority of God's Word, showing that when so much of Bible prophecy had already been fulfilled to the letter, certainly then, the last part of prophecy towards which world events were even now heading would, without a doubt, have fulfilment also.

The Call to the Christian Ministry

HE most vital thing in the welfare of mankind is the message of Christianity. That the Almighty God, in the person of Jesus of Nazareth has provided redemption for a fallen and accursed race. Apart from this, individual life is a miserable round of vanity, and the life of mankind in general is a bitter, worthless struggle for existence.

The greatest mission in life is to dedicate oneself to the work of spreading this message, and winning men to the Christ of God—in other words, to become a preacher of the gospel. C. T. Studd said that he would rather lead a soul to Christ than be Queen Victoria. And truly the highest vocation that can ever be the lot of a sinful man is to become "worthy of being put into the ministry" (I. Tim. i. 12).

But, this ministry, we must remember, is not for everyone. It is not a profession to be taken in the same manner that one might decide to become a solicitor, or an accountant or such like. As with the priesthood of Aaron, so with this holy office "no man taketh this honour unto himself, but he that is called of God" (Heb. v. 4).

Alas! for the multitude to-day that fill the pulpits of this and other lands who have never heard the divine call, but are partakers in the gainsaying of Korah. Spurgeon states in his lectures, "There are many young men who miss their way in life and bump into a pulpit." True indeed! In the last few years I have met many of my old schoolmates, and have been

SURPRISED TO FIND

that they had "entered the Church." Most of them walked about resembling smoking chimney-pots, and so I have made pointed inquiries about their salvation, and in almost every case have found they were ignorant of the first principles of Christianity. Blind leaders of the blind, and the day of reckoning is coming when they will both fall into the ditch.

But this article is directed chiefly to earnest Christian young men and women who are wondering if they really have the "call" for the Lord's work. I cannot emphasise too strongly the immense care that one must exercise in this matter. There have been so many cases of utter disillusionment with young people who thought they had the call, but after a little while have discovered their tragic mistake. Such things do incalculable harm to the work of God. Young man, if you think you have received a call, rest not day nor night till you are sure it comes from God, and is not merely the call of the outward glamour of the ministry, which will pass away like the morning dew.

Now what is it constitutes a "call"? I want to say immediately that no dogmatic answer can be given. The "call" is beyond definition, and must be settled between the individual and God alone. God calls in different ways. To Moses it was the burning

bush. To Samuel the audible voice. To Peter the simple call "Follow Me." "There are

DIVERSITIES OF OPERATIONS,

but it is the same God " (I. Cor. xii. 6).

The following illustrations will serve to show the various ways in which the "call" comes to different people.

1. By direct vision.

Paul received the vision of the outstretched hands and the cry, "Come over and help us." It was the divine call and he obeyed. The God of the Christian Church of the first century is the God of the twentieth century Church, and, blessed be His name, He still calls His people by the means of visions. Many illustrations of this could be given, but the following will suffice, taken from Hugh Redwood's book, God in the Slums, page 118:

"She was a country lass who had never been to London. . . . The family were Baptists, and she herself was a Baptist Church worker. One Sunday she heard an arresting sermon from a visiting minister. His theme was that of personal service. God, he declared had a specific task for every individual, and by no other person could that task be performed. . . . " Make no mistake," said the preacher, "He has a task for you," and to the listening girl his finger seemed to be pointed directly at her. She was powerfully affected, and went straight home after the service, and in the privacy of her bedroom prayed that God would show her what it was that He expected from her. Instantly (she says) I heard a voice. It was perfectly distinct and I heard it as plainly as I now hear you. It said, "I want you to work among the poor as an officer in the Salvation Army." She rose from her bedside in awe, feeling

CONVINCED THAT GOD HAD SPOKEN

to her. But her own minister, to whom she went for counsel, warned her against allowing herself to believe any such thing. She suffered herself to be pursuaded.

"A little later she went to live for a while in London. Her parents became Salvationists and presently she, too, was wearing the uniform. The sense of a call returned insistently when she resumed her home life. She volunteered for officership, was summoned to London for an interview, told her story—and was refused. She was downcast, but the sequel came quickly.

"That night I had what I suppose you would call a dream, but it was much more vivid than an ordinary dream. I saw myself in the midst of a great number of very poor people, whose faces were very clear. And then I heard the same voice as before, saying to me, 'These are the people. I want you to work among them as a Salvation Army officer.'

"That time she felt no doubt. She wrote urgently to London, and in less than a month she was in a

training home. Her first appointment was Whitechapel, and her first experience an open air meeting outside a notorious public house. The doors of the bar shot suddenly open and a drunken man was thrown violently into the road. She could see his face plainly, and her heart gave a leap, because she recognised it. It was one of the faces she had seen in her dream and had never forgotten. Then she looked about her in the crowd, and recognised others. This first man afterwards became a

WONDERFUL TROPHY OF GRACE."

Blessed are they who are called in this manner.

2. The challenge of a needy world.

"Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields," was the command of the Lord. When we do this, who, that really loves the Lord, can fail to be stirred with His compassion as we see a world sunk in sin, and needing the gospel—"God's remedy for sin." To many, it is this tremendous challenge of a needy world that has constituted the divine call. They have realised that to stay at home in ease and comfort would be to deny the faith, and so the challenge has been met. Perhaps this can best be illustrated by the experience of C. T. Studd, the great All-England cricketer who left all for Christ.

After missionary life in China and India, C. T. was in Liverpool in 1908, and saw a strangely worded notice that caught both his attention and his sense of humour. "Cannibals want missionaries." "Why, sure they do, for more reasons than one," said he to himself, "I will go inside and see who could have put up such a notice as that." As he thought, it was a foreigner, Dr. Karl Kumm. But God was in that strange impulse, for in that meeting He called C. T. to the great work of his life. He writes later:

"Karl Kumm had walked across Africa and was telling of his experiences. He said that in the middle of the continent there were numbers of tribes who had never heard of the story of Jesus Christ. He told us that explorers had been to those regions, and

Arabs and traders, European officials and scientists, but no Christian had ever gone to tell of Jesus. The shame sank deep into one's soul. I said, 'Why have no Christians gone?' God replied, 'Why don't you go?' 'The doctors won't permit it,' I said. The answer came, 'Am I not the Good Physician? Can I not take you through? Can I not keep you there?' There were no excuses, it had to be done."

He was now nearly fifty, and broken down in health. Consequently he was refused by the committee to whom he offered himself. His answer to the committee was, "Gentlemen, God has called me to go, and I will go. I will blaze the trail, though my grave may only become a stepping stone that younger men may follow." He further writes, that to him, the need was the voice of God, saying, "Dare you spend the remainder of your days in England, knowing of these masses who have never heard of Jesus Christ? If you do, how will you meet Me henceforth before My throne?" That settled the matter. After such a word it was impossible to have the pluck to stay in England.

When due to start he sounded out the challenge to

the Christian world, "Last June at the mouth of the Congo there awaited a thousand prospectors, traders, and gold seekers waiting to rush into these regions, as soon as the Government opened the door to them, for rumour declared that there was an abundance of gold. If such men hear so loudly the call of gold and obey it, can it be that the ears of Christ's soldiers are

DEAF TO THE CALL OF GOD,

and the cries of the dying souls of men? Are the gamblers for gold so many, and gamblers for God so few?"

Does the need of the world strike you like this? Does it crush you with shame to realise that whilst millions die in sin and darkness, you live in ease and idleness? Does it challenge you to become a "gambler for Christ." This can well be the call of God. Seek His guidance in the light of His Word.

3. An uncontrollable desire.

Paul says, " If any man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work." Many have had the experience of a burning desire in the heart to enter the Lord's work. This can well be the call. But just a little word of warning. If you have the desire, and whilst you are waiting for God to open the "door" you do nothing but just attend meetings and live a "good" life, whilst you never strive to win the dying souls around you for Christ, be sure that your " call " is not from God. The desire that I refer to is one that burns in your heart and leads you out in energetic service for the Lord. You do not wait to be asked to do things, but always in your heart there is the urge to be "on duty." You must be giving out tracts, or "button-holing" people, or speaking in the open air, etc. When you become like this, and then feel the consciousness of a desire for the full-time work, this can well be the "call." The experience of D. L. Moody will serve as an illustration of this. From

he started to serve the Lord in every way he could think. He rented pews in his church and brought in young men to them every Sunday. Then he commenced his own Sunday school in the slums of Chicago. His own words were these, "I thought numbers were everything, and so I worked for numbers. When it ran to 1,500 I was elated. Still none were converted; there was no harvest. Then God opened my eyes.

"There was a class of young girls in the school, who were the most frivolous set I ever met. One Sunday the teacher was taken ill and I took that class. They laughed in my face and I felt like opening the door and telling them all to get out and never come back. That week the teacher of that class came into my store looking very ill.

"' 'What is the trouble,' I asked.

"' I have had another hemorrhage of my lungs. I

suppose I am going to die.'

"He seemed greatly troubled, and when I asked the reason he replied, Well, I have never led any of my class to Christ. I really believe I have done more harm than good to those girls."

I am far from the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that ever were built, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together have not affected the life of man upon this earth as has that One Solitary Life!

We all know what it is for our foot to begin to slip. Temptations flash upon us one after the other until it seems that we must yield. The result will depend upon whom we tell about it. If in the hour of crisis we say to ourselves, "My foot slippeth," we shall find no help. But if we cry to God, in His mercy He will uphold us.

"I had never heard anyone talk like that before, and it set me thinking. After a while I said, 'Suppose you go and tell them how you feel. I will go with

you in a carriage.'

"He consented, and we started. It was one of the best journeys I ever had on earth. We went to the first house and the teacher talked to the girl about her soul. There was no laughing then, and the tears were in all our eyes. We prayed, and

It was the same with all the others. When his strength gave out I took him back to his lodgings. The next day we went out again, till all were saved.

"He had to leave the next night, so I called his class together for a prayer meeting, and there God kindled a fire in my soul that has never gone out. The height of my ambition had been to be a successful business merchant, and if I had known that that meeting was going to take that ambition out of me, I might not have gone. But how many times have I thanked God since! The dying teacher read, prayed and sang, and as I went out I said to myself, 'O God, let me dierather than lose the blessing I have received to-night.'

"I didn't know what this was going to cost me. I was disqualified for business: it had become distasteful to me. I had got a taste of another world, and cared no more for making money. Oh, the luxury of leading men out of the darkness of this world into the

light and liberty of the gospel."

If you have a burning desire like that man, it is from God. But if it is a desire that allows you to

lead an easy Christian life, leave the Christian ministry alone.

Finally I want to say that there is a call to all who name the name of Christ. It may not be the call to the public ministry, but it is a call to rescue the perishing souls around you. So often when we ask people to do this for the Lord, or do that, we receive the Devil's response, "I don't feel called." I will close with quoting the words of General William Booth: "Not called, did you say? Not heard the call, I think you should say." He has been calling loudly ever since He spoke your sins forgiven—if you are forgiven at all—

you to be His ambassador. Put your ear down to the Bible, and hear Him bid you go and pull sinners out of the fire of sin. Put your ear down to the burdened, agonised heart of humanity, and listen to its pitiful wail of help. Go and stand by the gates of hell and hear the damned entreat you to go to their father's house, and bid their families not come there. then look Christ in the face, whose mercies you profess to have got, and whose words you have promised to obey, and tell Him whether you will publish His mercy to the world. You must not sit still. Get up. Shake yourself. Do something; do it at once; go on doing it; do it with your might. Spare no pains. Never stop any more. Read, give, pray, talk, sing-do anything you can to make the lost everywhere know the truth about themselves, about Christ, and about heaven and hell. If you will God will help you.
