# An Unopened

"But my God shall fully supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus."—Phil. iv. 19 (Newberry).

T an hour such as this when we stand at the dawn of another new year our thoughts will doubtless prove both retrospective and prospective. However loth we may be to admit it the past is inescapable. And yet somehow these two outlooks upon life are more closely and vitally related than we realise.

That the future must, to some extent, be influenced by the past is obvious. Whilst memory shall survive this must be so. The past yields either a harvest of comfort or condemnation, or perhaps, more often than not, an admixture of the two.

But I think most of us are able and anxious to recapture some of the splendid inspirations of bygone days. We do not wish to ignore, either the warnings or the exhortations, which come to us down the labyrinth of years. Those far-off days taught us much that must be of value while life shall persist. We cannot afford to forget the blessed contributions which those experiences made to the success of our Christian career, or the impetus which they gave to us along the pathway of devotion. We are equal to the responsibilities of to-day because of those blessed baptisms of yesterday. In the mirror of memory many of us can see reflected the unfailing mercy and goodness of God, and perhaps from the vantage ground of maturity we can discern far more in those earlier experiences than once we thought possible.

In a sense we are always standing on the borderland of the unknown. And to faith the unknown may prove an inviting wonderland of possibility and promise. God's challenge to His people as they stand on

the portal of another new year comes with bracing clearness—" Prove Me now . . . and see."

Yes, God is eager to find those souls who will give Him the opportunity that He seeks to work wonders. He is ready in the realm of human experience to demonstrate the exceeding greatness of

His power. All that is really remarkable in the history of the Christian Church was born out of splendid response to the divine challenge to attempt what looked like the impossible.

Perhaps some bend fearfully over the new volume of 1937, almost afraid to open its pages. What do those unsealed pages contain? is a question which many a heart is asking. Will it prove a year of terrible upheaval—of inescapable calamity—of overwhelming disaster? Will the grasping hand of imperialistic ambition be stretched forth in fresh attempts at conquest and annexation? Will it witness the final collapse of the existing civilisation? In this connection we are reminded of that familiar line of one of our hymns, "God kindly veils mine eyes." In the infinite wisdom of God He makes known the things to come according to the measure of our capacity to bear the vision.

There are at least two things that should powerfully influence God's people at this time. One is the pressing need of revival in the world to-day; apart from this catastrophe seems inevitable and imminent. And the other is the untapped resources of God which can be released by living faith. There are mountains of difficulty confronting the Church of God, and we must

not shut our eyes to these things, but what are they when compared with the omnipotence of Jehovah?

Though the future is veiled, and an element of uncertainty enters into all our calculations for to-morrow, yet the fundamental fact always emerges, viz., that

the great Jehovah-Jireh of yesterday is the "Great I Am" of today. And when such a conviction forms part of our equipment for the oncoming days we are able to meet all possible demands. With such spiritual and moral reinforcement we shall never find ourselves bankrupt. The God-centred soul can never become insolvent. Whether our vision is confined within purely personal limits or reaches out into the larger national or international orbit, the same sufficient fact remains, equally powerful and practical in its application to the larger sphere of interest. However vast and farreaching the problems that face humanity there stands One who is eternally equal and able to their solution.

Whatever the future holds, and we could well dispense with some of the fanciful and fantastic pre-

dictions which occasionally find their way into the currency of sound and sane Scripture exegesis, we know that it must bring a development of the Divine plan. The Architect of the Ages is moving on to the

completion of His programme on earth, and the consummation of His purpose is growing nearer year by year. The hands of God's clock are not stationary. The arm of the Lord is not held up owing to unforeseen emergency. Things are work-


ing out as God has planned.

Hallelujah!

The great link 'twixt past and future is, of course, with us in the present. It is the *upward* aspect that saves from the fear of the future, and the condemnation of the past. It is at the Throne that we discover the interpretation of the puzzling past, and it is there that we are able to claim invigorating assurance for the future.

In our Movement as a whole and in our lives personally may 1937 witness a fresh accession of divine power, a new baptism of divine love, a fuller acceptance of the Cross and a deeper surrender to the spirit of separation. We must remember that the greatest and most effective testimony is not that of the badge we wear or the flag we unfurl, but the lives that we live. Let the world feel the impact of lives surcharged with

the true passion of Pentecost and the New Year will see that which will gladden the heart of the Master whom we serve, and advance the cause which we love.



# Foursquare Anniversary in Geneva conversions, healings, baptismal & communion services

Twelve months ago Principal George Jeffreys conducted his second Foursquare Gospel Campaign in Geneva, when the great Reformation Hall (in which the League of Nations met for ten years) was again the centre of glorious revival. The following report from Mlle. E. Ducommun gives praise to God for the first anniversary of the Foursquare Church that was established in this international city.—ED.

A SERVICE of praise and thanksgiving to God was held on the 20th of November, 1936, at the Salle Naville, Reformation Hall, Geneva. It was the first anniversary of the Foursquare Gospel Church in Geneva.

Hearts were filled with gratitude to God for what "He had wrought" during the year. That an assembly had been established as a lasting and living memento of the wonderful campaign held by Principal George Jeffreys in October, 1935. Then the city of Geneva had been powerfully blessed, thousands of conversions as well as miracles of healing. The result was a dire need and cry for a Church founded on the Foursquare Gospel message.

Amidst much opposition and many difficulties, and in answer to prayer, one "who being in the way," answered God's call and stepped out. We praise God for the faithful ministry of Pastor A. Hunziker.

Hallowed times of blessing are witnessed at the

breaking of bread services on Sunday mornings. The sound Bible readings attract many from various denominations. The prayer meetings are certainly the largest in the city. Sunday evenings there is a gospel

# The Crystal Palace

HE Crystal Palace has gone and somehow London does not seem quite the same place without it. Something has disappeared which cannot be replaced. A strange sense of personal loss came over the writer as he stood, the morning after the great fire, gazing upon the smouldering ruins of that famous temple of glass. And no doubt many a heart among the thousands of sightseers experienced a similar sensation.

One could pick out here and there amid the charred debris something that indicated the place where but three brief months previously they had joined with other of the Lord's people in joyous fellowship. There stood the wrecked remains of the bandstand where so recently the London Crusader Choir had voiced their gladness. And there too was the spot where the Elim Book Stall had displayed its goods, and from which the Elim Records had sent forth their familiar strains. Yonder was where the Concert Hall once stood—we can see it now as it was last September thronged with radiant youth, engaged in enthusiastic demonstration. Ah, and there was the charred remains of the once

glorious Grand Organ to the strains of which thousands of Elim Crusaders from all over the British Isles had blended their hearts and voices in joyous acclamation.

Yes, it all seemed so fresh and vivid in the memory. One could scarcely realise that such terrible transformation had taken place in such a short time, and that such a work of beauty and art was now no more. As we turned from that wreck-strewn spot a weight seemed to rest upon the spirit, and the uppermost thought in our mind was that there would he no more glorious Elim Crystal Palace

Looking upon that scene of destruction one's mind instinctively contrasted it with the vision which Thackeray pictures in his memorable lines:

A blazing arch of lucid glass
Leaps like a fountain from the grass,
To meet the sun."

For over eighty years the Crystal Palace stood as one of London's most imposing and impressive landmarks. Originally erected in Hyde Park in connection with the great Exhibition of 1851, it was later rebuilt on the Sydenham site, and has been the scene of many great gatherings connected with the national life of Britain.

The two giant towers may be seen for miles on a clear day, and from the summit of the north tower a magnificent view may be obtained which is unrivalled by that commanded from any other vantage point in London. Hundreds of thousands of people have taken advantage of the water-balanced lift, which the tower contains, to ascend this dizzy height and contemplate the Metropolis from above. These twin towers have survived this disastrous fire to remind us of that departed transparent glory that once crowned the green slopes of the Palace grounds.

The history of the Palace makes most interesting

reading. It must ever be associated with one of the most illustrious and beloved members of the English Royal Family, the Prince Consort, who was mainly responsible for the building being raised.

The first drawing was made on a rough piece of blotting paper by the architect, a fterwards Sir James Paxton, who, from the lowly position of a gardener's boy, rose to the honour of knighthood.

The building at the time of the 1851 Exhibition created tremendous interest and drew enormous crowds within its transparent walls. So popular did it become that at the close of the Exhibition it was decided to transfer it to the present site at Sydenham, and there three years later with many improve-



ments and alterations, it was re-erected as a permanent legacy of beauty to the thronging thousands of the Empire's great Metropolis.

When one considers that this great structure, comprising no less than 242 miles of glass, covered an area of over 19 acres, and cost £1,350,000 to erect, it will be realised what a gigantic undertaking it really was to transfer it from Hyde Park to Sydenham.

It was in 1854, the year of the Crimean War, that the Palace was opened by Queen Victoria before a crowd of 40,000 people. It soon became a centre of

attraction to London's pleasure-loving thousands, its huge Centre Transept being thronged with those who had come to share some great musical feast, or to participate in one or other of the large celebrations and anniversaries which were often held in this famous building.

At one of these festivals of music and song the orchestra comprised "242 violins and violas, 120

'cellos and bass viols, 100 instruments of the woodwind, brass and percussion, and 2,700 voices soared and fell to an audience of nearly 100,000.''

Many great religious gatherings have been held in the Crystal Palace during the past eighty years. It was here that C. H. Spurgeon once preached to a vast congregation, the numbers of which has been given as over 40,000. The Salvation Army have also held

some of their largest in celebrations Crystal Palace. During the past six years this great palace of glass has witnessed some remarkable demonstraconnection tions in with our own movement. Annually thousands of Foursquare Gospel enthusiasts have assembled to participate in the wonderful meetings conducted by Principal George Jeffreys, until to-day the Crystal Palace had come to be regarded almost with affection by the vast crowds that thronged these gatherings of God's people.

There have been remarkable cases of conversion and healing during the year. Some have also been baptised in the Holy Spirit. A baptismal service was held in April, 1936, in the great Reformation Hall. It was the first

held in a hall in the city. Twenty candidates passed through the waters of baptism. It was a most impressive service, leaving an indelible impression on the vast audience. This was followed by a second one in July, when forty candidates publicly confessed their faith in obedience to God's Word. The actual hall—annexe of the Reformation Hall—is getting too small for accommodation. The Church has already moved out of a lesser hall in the same building and we foresee that the large Reformation Hall will soon be required. For years before the Church was even started saints have been praying for this.

Another cause for praise is that, in two other towns branches have become connected with the mother-Church. One is La Chaux-de-Fonds, the other Yverdon. This one may become a centre of revival fire, owing to its strategic position. The newly-formed choir has begun practical social work. Swiss refugees are arriving daily from Spain destitute of everything. They are met at the station by the town

officials and members of the Foursquare Church. Some fifty-five persons have been entirely clothed. By request made through the press, parcels of clothing are sent; 680 garments for women, 313 for men and 395 for children have been received. Also 140 pieces of household furniture. Interest and sympathy have awakened and people get into contact with the Church and are ready to listen to the Foursquare message.

We pray for guidance for the future. It is of real importance that a strong work be established in this international city.

We praise Him for all that is past,

And trust Him for all that is to come.

HE heading quoted above appeared in the public press a few days ago when Councillor John Hague was elected as Chief Citizen of Glossop. The speeches of those who spoke at the Council meeting all describe him as "a great Christian," and told how he carried his Christianity into every Council meeting, and how the spirit of Christ adorned his every word and action in the service of the town. They spoke of his tenacity of purpose and conviction. One speaker told how Councillor Hague was known "all over the town. Everybody knows him—every lad and girl, and he is called 'Lord John,' 'Honest John,' 'King of Whitfield,' and I don't know what besides, but whatever you call him he is always the same."

The speech of the Mayor in reply, reads more like a sermon than a Mayoral address. It was a speech never to be forgotten. He first said that he wanted publicly to thank God for the way in which the Lord had honoured him by making him the first minister of law and justice in the town. His one desire was that he would always be big enough to be a Christian in all his work. He hoped to carry that out to its logical conclusion. He would never compromise with his convictions. A certain promise out of the Bible was particularly encouraging him, "Fear thou not, for I am with thee: be not dismayed, for I am thy God; I will strengthen thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of My righteousness." The promises of God meant more to him than anything else.

He then referred to world conditions. He pointed out the sin and misery and uncertainty on every hand. He was fearless in bringing wickedness into the limelight. It seemed the Council Chamber had never heard a speech like this before. He then declared that what was wrong with the world was that we have left God out of all our calculations. We cannot hope to be better while we do so. What we want is a peace conference with God and to repent of our waywardness. We cannot leave God out and prosper. The Mayor made it clear that in all his actions during his year of office he would seek the guidance of God. And in conclusion said, "I shall know no politics; I am not the Mayor of any Party; I am the Mayor of Glossop, and let me say finally, 'To God be all the glory.'"

The Churching of the Mayor took place the following Sunday in the Elim Tabernacle when a congregation of about 800 crowded the church and enjoyed what the press calls a "most edifying and hearty service which was both bright and stirring."

The Town Clerk read the Lesson and Pastor Gaunt, the Mayor's chaplain, preached from Psalm xix. 7: "The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul."

At the conclusion of his sermon Pastor Gaunt said: " In this law is the basic principle of peace. We hear a lot about peace to-day, but let it be realised that man cannot be in right relationship with man unless he is individually in right relationship with God. Man cannot be in right relationship with God unless he is first right with his neighbour. Peace is a condition which is created as a result of a cause. It is not a cause in itself but the effect of a cause. It is the effect of right relationship between man and man. This relationship is entirely dependent upon each individual being right with God. A closing story will interest us all. Father gave to his boy of seven a birthday gift which proved to be a jig-saw puzzle. One side of the jig-saw represented a map of the world while the other side represented a man. Try as he would he could not get the world right. The more he tried the more difficult it became. father came home at lunch time the boy came up to him with a beaming face. 'Dad, I've done it!' The father replied: 'I tried to do it and could not. How did you manage it? ' The boy replied: ' I got the man right first and when I turned it over I saw that the world had put itself right.' That story does not need the moral to be explained. We seem to have been too busy trying to put world conditions in order. It is a change of heart in the individual that is needed. God provides for that in His wonderful redemption. Let the nation get back to God and back to the Bible, and she will sing with David, 'The law of the Lord is perfect.

We are sure that the whole Elim family throughout the British Isles will rejoice in this great testimony, and will most heartily pray that God will uphold and strengthen and guide our brother in all the great work and responsibilities that God has called him to. We congratulate him and say most warmly, "God bless you and your Mayoress."

What welcome words to hear from their captain. That test of faith was now over, and these twelve priests could join their brethren on the grassy banks of Jordan, over in Canaan land. These words remind us of those spoken to the apostle John in the Isle of Patmos: Come up hither." On that day he left the dreary isle to witness scenes of a different kind. The word here translated "rams' horns" is "Yobel," which is rendered "Jubilee" twenty-one times in other parts of the Old Testament. In Young's Literal Translation it is rendered: "seven trumpets of the jubilee." It was really a Jubilee year for Palestine, for the land was going back to its original owner: the Lord of hosts, and to the children of

Abraham to whom He had promised it over four hundred years before. These rams' horns were from the animals which had been used for sacrifices; and as an animal's strength is said to go largely to its horns, the priests were blowing on what might be described as the strength of the sacrifice. Let us, who are a royal priesthood, not fail to blow on the strength of the sacrifice of Calvary, and to proclaim to the world that the year of jubilee has come.

"Shout; for the Lord hath given you the city" (verse 16).

That was a shout of faith, for when they raised their voices in that shout those walls stood as firm and strong as the day when they first cast eyes upon them. Faith wins us for God as nothing else can, it so destroys self-confidence and pride and takes away everything from us which might cause us to fall.

# Saturday, January 9th. Joshua vi. 20-27.

"Cursed be the man before the Lord. that riseth up and buildeth this city Jericho " (verse 26).

But there did arise a man more than six hundred years afterwards who built the city of Jericho. Let us see what became of the word of the Lord which Joshua spake: "In his days did Hiel the Bethelite build Jericho: he laid the foundation thereof in Abiram his firstborn, and set up the gates thereof in his youngest son Segub, according to the word of the Lord, which he spake by Joshua the son of Nun" (I, Kings xvi. 34). Those were dark days in Israel, and men had got far away from God; the word of God was largely lost sight of, and all confidence in its fulfilment seemed to have disappeared; but God was watching, and the threatened judgment fell in spite of their unbelief. And so to-day, God watches over His word to perform it, even though many centuries have passed away since it was spoken. THE historic setting of these words is both significant and challenging, and considered thus present at least three great facts.

- 1. Divine government relative to Christian life.
- 2. Divine guidance relative to progressive Christian experience.
- 3. Divine procedure relative to Christian conquest.

The children of Israel had years previously left Egypt and traversed much of the wilderness in the direction of the Promised Land, but had never before crossed the Jordan. To them the Jordan and the land on the other side was unknown territory. Hence, the significance of the challenge to a great venture contained in Joshua's words, "Ye have not passed this way heretofore." Standing on the threshold of another year which to all of us is unknown, these words are very applicable to ourselves. This will be seen more clearly by examining past history to glean information that will prove beneficial in preparing us for our venture into the unknown of this year.

1. Divine government relative to Christian life.

The Israelites were venturing into the unknown because God had ordered the march forward. The passage through Jordan was

# ACCORDING TO DIVINE DECREE.

Israel had pledged allegiance to the sovereignty and government of God, therefore Joshua having received his instructions from Jehovah communicated them to the people. A new emergency had arisen and God, whose government is autocratic, gave them the orders for a forward move without consulting them as to what they thought about it. As Christians we need to remind ourselves continually that God must be absolute monarch in our lives, and that His authority must be accepted as final in all matters relating to our experience. Having admitted God into our lives He cannot and will not agree to sharing the throne of our heart with others. Recognition of this fact is important and imperative for there are many competitors to God's authority in our lives. For instance, there is the competitive and challenging attitude and activity of Satan who continually seeks to usurp God's rightful place in our heart and mind. There is also the competitive challenge of the flesh with its adamic propensities and tendencies that are so susceptible to being enticed into doing things that are contrary to the will of God.

Again, God's command to the Israelites to cross the Jordan must at first have greatly disturbed them, for they all, except Joshua and Caleb, constituted a new generation born in the wilderness after the crossing of the Red Sea. Their ancestors who had

the Red Sea and witnessed the mighty deliverance from a pursuing Pharaoh and his hosts, all perished in the wilderness through unbelief. Now, the children born

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of them are faced with a new, and from the human viewpoint, an insurmountable difficulty. They saw before them the deep and tasts flowing plordar, and as they had no mechanical or material means of crossing it, they undoubtedly felt as little disturbed at the order to march.

The Christian entering into the unknown territory of this year may at times expect the divine government to be a challenging and disturbing clement in the life. 

3. Divine procedure relative to Christian conquest.

The method of procedure adopted by God concerning the crossing of the River Jordan was of a rather unusual character. Usually when the ark was carried by the priests during the wilderness journeyings some of

before and others behind it, thus symbolising that God was in the midst of His people. On this occasion none marched before for God instructed that all were to follow behind the ark carried by the priests. Now Jordan means death, and is also the symbol of separation. In going before His people in the ark into the Jordan God was teaching them that they could only become the conquerors and inheritors of the Promised Land by dying to every self element that would prevent them wholeheartedly surrendering to His control. The victory could only become theirs by following God through the waters of death and separation. The old life of Egypt was behind them and they were about to enter into the possibilities of a life under the government of God in Canaan, the land flowing with milk and honey. Joshua assuring them of certain victory under the generalship of Jehovah declared, "Hereby ye shall know that the living God is among you, and that without fail He will drive out from before you the Canaanites and the Hittites." The Christian can only conquer throughout 1937 as long as there is abnegation of self and absolute surrender to God.

In the Word we read that Christ went down into death and rose again the third day in resurrection life, power and glory. The conversion of a sinner is described as dying with Christ to the old life and the world, and being raised again in the

# POWER OF A NEW LIFE.

Therefore, the Christian is to reckon himself dead to the self life, and give to God the service of a consecrated life. This is the will of God for all His people. Paul writing to the Thessalonian Christians expressed it thus, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit, and soul, and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (I. Thess. v. 23). In the fourth chapter he says, "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification" (v. 3). God decrees we should be holy, and we should mark this carefully, and by His grace respond to it instantly. That our sanctification is the will of God should settle every

question of holiness for us, and serve as an impetus to a deeper devotion to God.

How challenging is the thought that if we are to conform to the plan of God, then of necessity there must be the sanctification of the spirit, soul and body.

The sanctification of the spirit. The spirit is not a possession of man; it is the man himself—he is a spirit. The spirit is the God-conscious part of man, therefore the spirit of every Christian is linked on to God in community of life. Because of the importance in relation to victory of this inner contact of our spirits with God, Paul prays that they may be set apart unto or

The sanctification of the soul. Life has its seat in the spirit, and expresses itself through the soul and body. Science teaches that the soul's faculties are many: the mind, will, memory and instinct, in fact all the qualities that make up personality. It is the will of God that the Christian's mind, will and personality are set apart unto Him so that he will advance and conquer every step of the way.

The sanctification of the body. By the deeds of the body the Christian is to express Christlikeness. He is exhorted by Paul to present his body a living sacrifice unto God (Rom. xii. 1). Now the Apostle Peter refers to Christians as priests unto God (I. Peter ii. 5). Paul therefore appeals to us as priests unto God to present and surrender our bodies as a living sacrifice to the Lord. The word present indicates to make complete (original). Holiness is simply another word for health, both being derived from the Anglo-Saxon word halig, meaning whole and complete. If we make such a presentation to God and allow Him to lead the way, then we need not fear the unknown, for with and in Him we shall be more than conquerors.

The saints have much cause to praise God for Pastor P. N. Corry's recent visit which brought lasting blessing to the church, and left behind a keener appetite for the Word of God.



There must have been great joy in the hearts of the faithful few who started the work thus to see that their labours had not been in vain.






Previous to the reception of the new members, Mr. Palliser spoke on the "Second Coming," and God honoured the word by the saving of four precious souls.

On the Saturday the Crusaders are on the "Bridge" at home, this time render-ing a service of song, "Gems from the Psalms."





# Warned, but Lost!

ROUND an historical old tombstone in Barnstaple, stood a number of seafaring men. Following an ancient custom, a local shipping firm were paying off on the old tombstone, and as they stood there some of the men must surely have been reminded by the stone how near death their calling often brought them.

Some years ago, a very experienced captain was cruising in the Mediterranean, searching for rocks and shoals in order that the official Admiralty charts might be as complete as possible. The work was done carefully and well, and the captain was satisfied that he had discovered everything. About the same time, however, another boat discovered an uncharted reef near the very spot where he had been cruising. They accordingly notified the Admiralty and the reef was inserted in the charts.

Some time afterwards, the captain of the first boat, in the course of another trip, found himself in the same waters again. As he was examining his chart, he was amazed to see the reef upon it. "There is no reef there," he said to an officer, " I know every foot of water round

" I suppose we had better steer clear of the spot

though," said the officer.
"'Certainly not," was the captain's reply. "That is a lie: there is nothing there and we will go straight ahead," and looking at his watch he added, "in another five minutes we shall have passed over the phantom reef."

A few minutes later, he took out his watch and said with a loud laugh, "I told you so. The time is past and we've gone over the reef." Hardly were the words out of his mouth than there was a harsh, grating noise, followed by a splintering crash.

"We're on the rocks," shouted the officer, white to the lips, and immediately a crowd of people streamed on deck, rushing madly for safety. The captain remained on the bridge to the end and went down with

the sinking ship. He had lost not only his own life, but also the lives of all those others simply because he would not believe the chart.

"What a foolish man," many will quite rightly exclaim. He was not only foolish but greatly worthy of He had the official chart which definitely warned him of the hidden danger, and he deliberately chose to ignore the chart and to take no heed to its warning. Had he trusted the chart, he and all the passengers would have been safe.

Yet, that captain was not so foolish as many other people are. He disregarded the warning of a chart which had been drawn by human hands and which might have been quite incorrect, but there are some people to-day who are disregarding a warning which comes, not from man, but from God, and which therefore must be true.

The Bible warns us that "The wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men" (Rom. i. 18), and also that "He hath appointed a day, in the which He will judge the world" (Acts xvii. 31). It warns us that there is danger ahead and shows us the fearful position in which we now stand. I wonder if you have ever listened to God's warning to "flee from the wrath to come"? Perhaps you are acting just as foolishly as the captain: possibly you have never taken any heed to God's Word and do not believe there is any danger ahead of you.

Will you not learn a lesson from this story? Listen to God's warning and make certain that you are safe from all that may lie ahead. The Lord Jesus Christ died in order to save you from the wrath of God and from the horrors of hell. "He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities, the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and with His stripes we are healed "(Isa. liii. 5). He loved you so much that He gave Himself to save you. Will you not listen to His warning and accept the salvation that He so freely offers you?—F. A. T.
