

Impressive and Inspiring Scenes at the Royal Albert Hall, London

The Principal Ministers for the Forty-sixth Time to Enthralled Thousands

For the thirteenth Easter Monday in succession the great Royal Albert Hall was taken possession of by enthusiastic Foursquare Gospellers, who filled its vast auditorium morning, noon and night with the sound of their praises. Our beloved leader, Principal George Jeffreys, preached at the three gigantic meetings with all his old-time fervour; souls were saved, sick bodies were healed, two glorious testimonies in type were given to the Lord's death and resurrection (water baptism and breaking of bread), and the power of God was mightily manifested throughout the day.

T is Easter Monday, the great Christian festival of resurrection, and the writer finds himself one of that vast crowd of worshippers which throng the Royal Albert Hall. Sitting there amid those thousands of jubilant Foursquare Gospel believers, in an atmosphere of radiant gladness, is an experience indescrib-

ably glorious, and one which makes a profound and lasting impression upon the mind. A deep sense of wonder possesses one as they take their place beneath the dome of that great hall on such an occasion. That sea of upturned faces presents an awe-inspiring spectacle. There is no escaping that surging tide of spiritual passion which seems to come in from the ocean of God's fathomless, boundless love and grace, sweeping over the whole of the mighty congregation in an overwhelming flood of power and glory. No one possessed of the slightest degree of spiritual perception but must realise the impact of eternal forces-a sense of being brought into contact with divine realities grips one.

To those accustomed to religious life and fellowship which is barren of anything approaching enthusiasm this wonderful exhibition of joy must come as a staggering surprise. For the first time to witness these thousands of Christian men and women, bound together by the ties of a common hope, giving wholehearted expression to their gladness, is something essentially inexpressible.

What is the tremendous attraction that so completely conquers and captivates this great crowd of men and women? Which holds them for hours under the spell of some inescapable challenge? Where may we look for the true explanation of this lavish display of religious fervour and faith? And from whence comes this veritable torrent of holy emotion and enthusiasm?

We must remember that this great gathering has

now been held for thirteen years in succession, and in that period there has been ample time for its early enthusiasm to evaporate or exhaust itself. If, as some hasty critics assert, the power of attraction lies chiefly in the novelty of such gatherings, then surely we might expect that by this time this great demonstration would have become a spent force. Yet this is not the case. There is no sign of declining zeal or diminishing interest. That splendid enthusiasm which characterised those earlier demonstrations still persists. The same keen interest is manifest. In fact this great annual festival of praise has obviously gathered spiritual momentum through the years.

obviously gathered spiritual momentum through the years.

Methinks we must seek elsewhere for the secret of this impressive pageant of power and passion. It cannot be accounted for on the level of the ordinary. It is from above that the power is supplied. The driving force is divine. 'Tis true that there is organisation—splendid organisation—behind it all. But there is something more vital than this. Here are results which no carefully, cleverly prepared programme could possibly produce. You cannot organise creative forces nor plan spiritual dynamics. These things are beyond

the scope of human ingenuity. Demonstrations of divine power are not staged. There is a sovereignty in the realm of the supernatural which refuses to be set aside. It is as true to-day as when the words fell from the lips of the Lord-"the wind bloweth where it listeth." So are the operations of the Holy Spirit.

It has been our privilege to hear the Principal on many of these great occasions, but never in the recollection of the writer has there been such a marked manifestation of the unction of the Holy Ghost as that which rested upon him on Easter Monday evening. It was as though the mantle of the Most High

had fallen upon the preacher, investing him with special authority to proclaim the mind and the message of God—an authority which that mighty throng seemed to recognise and to which they were prepared to respond with the utmost abandon.

It was a great message. Great in its directness, dignity, and depthgreat in its compass and comprehensiveness—great in its simplicity, spontaneity and searching powergreat in its faithful and fearless challenge to the Christian Churchgreat in its clarion call to the nation. A message that bore both the impress of inspiration and individuality. Many of those keen-edged utterances found their way direct to the heart of that spellbound congregation.

Throughout the day the Principal's ministry had been definitely challenging, but in the evening service this challenge reached its climax. It was as a prophet under the constraint of a divine commission and possessed of a deep sense of urgency that he spoke. There was something almost volcanic in his words. Thought after thought fell from his lips that caught fire in the hearts of his hearers. Those impassioned words meant the unveiling of many a heart. Deep were the wounds inflicted but always with a view to the healing of those whose hearts were laid bare.

We only wish that the leaders of organised religion in this country could have listened to this inspired and inspiring message. Whilst of necessity it possessed a denominational emphasis, stressing those great fundamental truths for which the Foursquare Gospel Movement stands, yet it was a message with far more than denominational import and interest—it was a summons to surrender and separation to all who bear the name of Christ—a call to repentance and righteousness to this land and its people. If such a message could but find its way into the heart of this nation it would act as the divine breath did in the valley of dry bones when Ezekiel prophesied and those lifeless bones were transformed into an army pulsating with life and power. It was a magnificent call back to the Bible, not merely in belief, but also in practice.

The communion service provided a beautiful and fitting climax to a day of remarkable demonstration. It was the crowning act of worship. The Dove of the Divine Presence seemed to spread His wings o'er that white-covered table which contained the emblems of the great Passion. From a distance the table looked like a jewel set in that great crowd of We thought of the great truths communicants. of which it spoke and for which this Movement stands. Here was no altar, no incense, no robeclad priest, no ornate ritual, but Christ Himself manifest in the midst of His people in all the splendour of

His resurrection power and glory.

How full of sublime spiritual significance is this service. Far greater and grander than any so-called act of transubstantiation—the unspeakable glory of the overshadowing of God—the enveloping presence of the creative Spirit of Jehovah. There in the solemn hush of wordless worship, thousands of hearts were drawn into the deep, warm current of Christian fellowship, bearing them on into union with God Himself. And then upon the healing silence of those fragrant moments steals the strains of a spiritual song sung by the London Crusader Choir. Hearts rise in response to the tender appeal of this vocal melody:

> Jesus let Thy splendour Like a mantle fall, On this waiting spirit, Whilst I yield Thee all; Clothe me with Thy beauty, Bathe me in Thy will, And with life triumphant All my nature fill.

And then once more hearts are lifted Godward as softly and reverently the words of the chorus flow forth:

> Fellowship with Jesus, This is victory They who own His lordship Know true liberty.

As the Principal pronounces the benediction and the great crowd

commences to make its exodus from the hall, reluctantly we realise that the demonstration is at an end. And yet that mighty throng is carrying away with it an abiding impulse to radiant and heroic Christian discipleship. How much this may mean in the fellowship to which these souls are returning. In some cases it will mean a new sense of vocation—in others a fresh impetus to sacrificial service. To all a glorious landmark in the history of the soul and of the Movement.

As we turned away from the scene of such splendid spiritual demonstration we could not but think of the blessed possibilities which the future holds for this Movement. What unimagined triumphs lies in its path as it moves on with God.

expectancy. It was a marvellous witness to the fact that thousands of people in that vast meeting loved the Bible, and believed it to be the inspired Word of God. As we sing the first hymn, "We have heard the joyful sound, Jesus saves," the tide of revival rises. We have had some good singing in the Royal Albert Hall but I venture to say that we have had nothing quite like this before. In this opening praise I sensed the "family" atmosphere. We Foursquare people are becoming more and more one family; closer and yet closer knit—

Names and sects and parties fall, And Thou, O Christ, art all in all.

The last verse was sung without hesitation and with more feeling and expression than I have ever known. After prayer the great audience began to sing in the spirit of worship a much-loved hymn, "Guide me, O Thou Great Jehovah," and "Songs of praises I will ever give to Thee." Not only once but again and again that vast host of people sang it. I thought they were never going to stop.

This first part of the service was a fitting preparation for the healing witness that was to follow. Those who had been cripples and had been healed by the power of God were requested to signify by a raised hand: twenty-seven hands were lifted up. Seven testified to being healed of deafness. Ten claimed to have had their sight restored. A further twenty-five delivered from cancers, tumours and growths. Hundreds of others witnessed to being healed of various

complaints. This testing of the service was a time of great spiritual power and refreshment. We are proving in a real sense the Scripture mentioned in Mark xvi. 17, "These signs shall follow them that believe." Thank God, the life-giving stream of healing is not dried up. There was intense reality and life about this testimony. A minister of

showed keen interest in this part of the service. He said it was very impressive and asked me to let him have the numbers of those who had just testified to being healed in Foursquare services. Who could it be that had healed all these people? Pastor Douglas Gray, our very able conductor of the young people's choir of 1,500 voices, gave us the answer when they began to sing a choir piece entitled, "Who could it be but Jesus?" Yes, Jesus saves and Jesus heals. Hallelujah! After the singing by the choir a great silence fell upon that colossal gathering. Not a voice was heard, not a hymn sheet fluttered, not a person moved. A holy awe was upon us. We Foursquare believers have peace; we are not seeking it. After this period of quiet worship, which was a living and not a dead silence, one voice alone was heard singing very softly, " Breathe on me, breath of God, Fill me with life anew." Ere long those thousands of Christians were singing it too. In the midst of this atmosphere alive with the power of God our beloved leader began to preach. He emphasised many important Bible truths, such as "Salvation is of grace and not of works." "The tradition of the elders says infant sprinkling is sufficient but the Bible teaches total immersion of the believer." "Mass has been substituted for the simple Breaking of Bread service." "People to-day are busy garnishing the tombs of dead prophets while rejecting the message of

"There is no cleansing from sin except through the precious blood of the Lamb." These are some of the Principal's words. They sounded like a trumpet. When the appeal was given fourteen souls responded. The power of the Holy Spirit was upon the Principal.

His address made a deep impression upon everyone. I have never known him grip and hold an audience so powerfully as he did this afternoon. It was good to see him on the bridge again after his illness. We praise our Lord for that recovery. The work of God goes on.

The Principal read Joshua i. 8 as a promise to the candidates before they passed through the waters of baptism. The majority of them encircled part of the gallery seats during the first part of the service—an impressive sight indeed. As believers were lowered into the waters the voice of the Principal was heard saying, "On the confession of your faith I baptise you in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost." Those words of consecration vibrated throughout the building. To the low mellow singing of "When I survey the wondrous Cross" each candidate was immersed in turn. The presence of Christ was greatly manifest. The sound of the waters through the microphone made the whole scene very realistic. We were enabled to visualise the Jordan scene when our Lord was baptised. It was a very reverent and orderly service. Under the anointing of the Holy Spirit the Principal guided, restrained, and controlled—his hand was upon every part of the service. We thank God for the fellowship of this service. A most fruitful and blessed time.

THIS MEMORABLE SERVICE

closed with a delightful chorus, "Oh, I love Him, yes, I love Him."

Before closing this article may I ask all my readers a question. Would you like to be well-pleasing to the Father-heart of God? Would you like to receive the Baptism in the Holy Spirit? If you would then listen to these words taken from the Bible. "Repent, and be baptised every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts ii. 38). As a Christian you cannot expect to receive the power from on high while you are living in daily disobedience to the Word of God. The path of true obedience to God will lead one through the waters of baptism. Arise, now and be baptised.

"Ask Ye of the Lord, Rain"

SK that shepherd, "What is your greatest need? " He will tell you that his greatest need is green pastures for his flock. You ask him, "Shepherd, tell me, how can you produce these green pastures?" He will tell you, "Only as the rain comes down from heaven can there be bountiful pastures for my sheep." And he will further say, " In the days of drought, my sheep are undernourished. They droop. They die. But when the heavens are opened and there is abundance of rain, the pastures spring up and then are my sheep fed. And as they eat they are strengthened. The little lambs skip for joy in the plentiful grass that springs up after the coming of the blessing-laden showers, the bountiful rains that fall from heaven.'

It is written, "Thou, O God, didst send a plentiful rain, whereby Thou didst confirm Thine inheritance, when it was weary. . . . Thou, O God, hast prepared of Thy goodness for the poor" (Psa. lxviii. 9, 10). Our

Lord is a Shepherd. His saints are called "the sheep of His pasture." Does He know what His sheep require? He knows that they require abundant pasture, and that above all they need the rain of His Spirit. He has promised this, declaring, "I will cause the shower to come down in his season; there shall be showers of blessing " (Ezek. xxxiv. 26).

It is a sure promise that in the last days He will pour out the rain of His Spirit. But He would have the saints to co-operate. He commands, "Ask ye of the Lord rain in the time of the latter rain; so the Lord shall make bright clouds, and give them showers of rain (Heb., matar geshem; literally, rain of plenty; pouring, heavy, torrential rain), to every one grass in the field " (Zech. x. 1). You have your part in praying the Lord of the harvest for the rain. In response to prayer He will send the rain of plenty; the pouring,

A T the close of the last century a Korean scholar and aristocrat, Yi Sang-jai, was cast into prison for two years by his autocratic king, for utterances derogatory to Eastern rule. On the outbreak of the Russon Japanese War, arrested on an unnamed charge, he was again imprisoned. "In my distress, unconsciously," he says, "I lifted up the corner of the coarse reed mat that covered my prison floor, when, lo, what should I see beneath it but a little book with red cover, and a Chinese inscription. It said, 'The Gospel According to St. John.' Had I found the elixir of life I could not have been more overjoyed. Here was a book, and I could read, and such a book. I read it through that day. Yes, read it through, twenty-one chapters and like a breath of life it was to me.

"The next day I read it again, and as I read I prayed that God would open my eyes. Would you believe it," said he, "as I read it and continued reading, Jesus rose before me, divine, the great Saviour. I had been wholly wrong in my estimate of Him. He was, as I saw from the first chapter of John, God indeed. After I had in no wise cast out."

The Changeless Christ at the Royal Albert Hall

moved amongst men and women in the towns and villages of Palestine. He taught them about God; He gave them hope in their despair; He healed their sicknesses. That changeless Christ continued His ministry in the Royal Albert Hall on Easter Monday, 1938.

The arena of London's most attractive public meeting forum was a mass of kneeling men and women. Bodies, marred and spoiled by sickness and disease, many for whom the doctors gave no hope, awaited in childlike faith the sympathetic touch of the allpowerful Nazarene. My lips framed words as the organ tones gave a softened background to the scene:

> Thou of life the Fountain art, Freely let me take of Thee. Spring Thou up within my heart, Rise to all eternity.

Moving silently, reverently, humbly and without ostentation amongst those hopefully expectant suppliants was an ambassador of Christ-Principal George Jeffreys. The message and ministry of divine healing, sadly neglected by the professing Church, has become a passion with him. And no wonder! His Lord has ministered healing to him. And can he withhold from the multitudes what he has himself experienced!

There were others praying too. For this was no cold formal religious meeting. It was a family gathering, and they were our brothers and sisters who were seeking the Lord.

A few moments before we had been loud in our acclamations of praise. Hallelujahs had made us hoarse. Joy had been written on our faces as we assented to the living words of the Principal's message. Our emotions

TWO thousand years ago the Lord Jesus Christ had risen to the occasion as we meditated on the power of the living Word and that of the written Word. With triumphant song we had acclaimed our risen Redeemer.

> But now another emotion had us in its grip. We were weeping with them that wept. How could we be indifferent to the sorrows of those who waited in hope for the healing touch of the Christ? We are members of one Body. Certainly the Christ was not indifferent. He has not confined His love to the ages that have gone. Neither are His feelings straitened. He whose resurrection we have so joyfully hailed is touched with the feeling of our infirmities. He is alive to the needs of His oppressed people. In that arena He was stemming the tide of the latter-day attack on His people. And in His Omnipotence He proved Himself stronger than the enemy of our souls.

> But there is a bigger thing than divine healing. Forty-three men and women discovered this as they responded to the Principal's salvation appeal. Many remarkable things have happened in the chequered history of the Royal Albert Hall. But nothing so momentous as the settling of eternal destiny. Yet nearly ten thousand people witnessed the surrender of forty-three of their fellows to the claims of Christ. There was no pageantry, no fanfare, no gorgeous ceremonial. Our aim, more than a slogan, is "Back to the Bible." And in the simplicity of our faith we rejoiced in the greatest things of time and eternity. Praise the Lord!

Sunday, May 8th. I. Kings xiii, 1,10.

"I will not go in with thee" (v. 8).

Praise God for a man of such uncompromising loyalty to his mission and fearlessness of man. To accept the king's hospitality would have been interpreted as a condonation of idolatry. God had indeed been merciful to Jeroboam. His act of healing had been one of great con-The prophet was now descension. tempted with temporal reward, but his God gave him the gift of discernment and the grace of separation. He had been warned by God and so forearmed. God will not allow His own to be suddenly trapped. Our God is faithful. Our safety lies in heeding and obeying the voice of the Lord. What precious love the Lord Jesus displayed when He said: "Behold I have told you before." Lord, so keep my heart attuned to Thine, that no other voice but Thine may hold sway over me!

PRAYER TOPIC:

For a day of wonderful spiritual manifestation and visitation in our churches.

Monday, May 9th. I. Kings xiii. 11-22. "So he went" (verse 19).

He had come through his first temptation with colours flying. Now another assailed him. In his first there were apparent signs of danger, also the eyes of many were upon him, watching his conduct. Then the devil, using a strange tool, made another trap for one whose downfall he had planned, and who was, doubtless, enervated by the test through which he had passed. The devil is no respecter of persons and he attacked this man of God relentlessly and most craftily. He resisted at first, knowing instinctively that the God who had spoken could not lie. Saturday, May 14th. I. Kings xviii.


"They found thee not" (verse 10).



Sunday School Superintendents and Teachers will be glad to know that a revised series of Sunday School Lessons and Notes are being issued for the July—September quarter and will contain lesson notes for Intermediate Junior and for Primary Classes. As these lessons are being prepared with considerable trouble and expense, and are meeting an increasing need in our own Movement it would be greatly appreciated if all Elim Schools adopted the scheme of lessons, prepared as they are, for the needs of our work and its particular doctrinal stand.

Congress of the Godless.

WE understand that it is the intention of the Central Council of the Godless organisation to hold its World Congress in London. We cannot but deplore such meetings being held in this country, and we trust that the authorities will refuse to permit this unholy proposal to be carried out in a land that has always nominally stood for God and His Word. A refusal on the part of the Government would serve as a justified rebuke to those who are sponsoring this shameless and organised repudiation of England's most sacred heritage.



must face the fact that modernism distorts, denies or questions every verity of fundamentalism. Do these new circumstances require new doctrines? Does a new age need a new message? Have the ideas and observations of man so progressed that we need new truths? Does the civilisation and culture of a so-called enlightened twentieth century demand a less elementary gospel?

The answer is that nineteen centuries since the first Easter morning, human nature has not changed, it has the same sorrows and sins, doubts and fears. How swiftly the thin crust of civilisation can be broken and hell let loose.

seen. The many thousands who three times filled the Royal Albert Hall on Easter Monday challenge the natural religionists of the day, who have substituted human psychology and philosophy for spiritual regeneration and education for evangelism. How glorious the result of the old-time gospel when translated by the power of the Holy Spirit into everyday life and experience! In these days of dual and ambiguous vocabularies, one finds it stimulating and heartening to meet with an honest, straightforward declaration of faith. It had seemed to us in the morning that all roads led to the Royal Albert Hall, the venue of Elim for the thirteenth year in succession.

That in itself is a trenchant, deep-cutting testimony of our confession of faith, as a movement and as individuals, for a faith that cannot be confessed is not worth confessing. Trains from north, south, east and west, monster coaches, cars, 'buses, all brought their burden of "joyous souls," while hundreds in true apostolic fashion were "minded to go afoot."

The vast congregation was tuned in like a human orchestra and sang as only the Spirit-filled can sing. The splendid choir thundered forth pæans of praise to God. We listened to their renderings of some oldfashioned hymns reminiscent of the Moody and Torrey revivals, rendered with weight of tone, ecstatic fervour and a degree of spirituality which was very inspiring. We had heard the singing of "The Messiah" to advantage on Good Friday. The soft nuances of tone were not lost and the long sibilants received full value on the ear. But as we listened to the congregational singing of the mammoth congregations, we thought of Dr. Handley Moule's notable utterance, "He saved us to annexe us." The loving Redeemer who died to save had subdued these thousands of wills, some so proud and rebellious, others wilful and worldly, winning their trust and love. And now "they live not unto themselves, but unto Him who died for them."

It seemed that we had reached the climax during Elim's year of Jubilee, but we had only reached one mountain peak to scale another. Yet as we sat in the vast auditorium, we thought of those pioneer days when the small Elim craft was launched and faced so bravely the whine of a gale of misunderstanding and opposition, soaring and straining so painfully ofttimes in the stormy, turbulent seas of financial difficulty. How expertly and adroitly the ship has been handled under recent extenuating and problematical circumstances and events. One would need the brush of a genius to portray to the mind of the reader the wide panorama of Elim's progress and the pageantry of her advance and achievement in twenty-one years. But the work did not finish with its Jubilee records. The brush was merely posed. One chapter closed, but the book goes on.

Our beloved Principal was in fine form. He bore no traces of his recent indisposition; of his miraculous healing there can be no doubt. Hallelujah! It was good to hear his fine, flexible voice rolling off his eloquent periods as of old. How utterly unspoiled he is by the signal success that has attended his ministry of preaching, teaching and healing. We recalled, as we marked his quiet demeanour and unostentatious bearing, that somewhere Kipling writes of men who are "festooned with the haberdashery of success." No one more than the founder and leader of the Elim work with its multifarious activities in the homeland and the regions beyond, at the present time could lay claim to success of the highest and truest kind, and no one that we know cares less for its haberdashery.

Back to the Bible! How appropriate the message when the nation commemorates the fourth centenary of the authorisation of Bible reading in our parishes. Back to the Bible; its revivals, its principles, its promises. The old guard is falling, the champions of fundamentalism are passing on to their reward. Dr. Dinsdale T. Young's voice is now silent. Bishop Taylor Smith lies in the silvery sepulchre of the sea. Where are the messengers to carry God's good news to sin-marred humanity?

Our beloved leader reminded us that the "Back to the Bible" preacher is to make the timeless truth of God's love for man and His hatred for sin live and throb and burn in human hearts. What a commingling of thoughts and sensations filled our hearts as the preacher pointed out that the red line of redemption runs parallel with the black line of moral and physical depravity from Genesis to Revelation. Praise be to God, hearts responded to the presentation of divine mercy and sovereign grace, hands were raised for prayer and faces lighted up indicative of a change within. Our hearts were deeply touched as we watched the solemn and beautiful ordinance of water baptism, and rejoiced in the unflinching testimony of those who thus obeyed their Lord. The whole of the afternoon service was one of true and lasting value.

the heavy, the torrential rain, so that there shall be "to every one grass in the field," abundant pastures for all His hungry sheep.

Everywhere there is need in the church. People hungry. People lacking so much. People dying. There is much preaching. There is much literature. What is the need? The outstanding need is the fulness of the Spirit of God. The Church needs that which God alone can send, and that which in response to the prayer of faith of His saints surely He will send—the blessed rain, the mighty showers, the gracious outpouring of His blessed Spirit. The promise is sure, "Fear not, O land; be glad and rejoice: for the Lord will do great things" (Joel ii. 21). What will He do? Great things! He will send the rain from heaven. He will pour out of His Spirit. Upon whom? Upon a limited few? Nay, "upon all flesh!" (Joel ii. 28). But He would be inquired of to do this for us (Ezek. xxxvi. 37).

When the Lord was in the garden of Gethsemane He asked His disciples to pray with Him, and they dis-

mally failed. And He has bidden His disciples of today, "Ask ye of the Lord rain," and they have dismally failed. But He would have us stir ourselves up, and remember to obey His command, "Ask." Has He not said, "Ask, and it shall be given you... for every one that asketh receiveth"? See what a heritage is ours if we will but pray without ceasing.

We shall see, as we pray, the copious showers of the Spirit from heaven. We shall see the green pastures spring up. We shall see the Church, the people of His pasture, nourished, fed, and flourishing. Pray then for rain. Ask for the Spirit, not merely for yourself, but for all flesh. The need of all flesh is for the Spirit of God. He alone can convict of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment. Words, songs, and all labour apart from the Spirit of God are in vain. Only that which is unctionised and under the power of the Holy Spirit will have any effect. Therefore pray for rain, the mighty rains of God's Spirit, that all you do may be in the power of the Spirit.

directions, some in luxury coaches, others in cars, not a few in taxis, and others by other means, yet all with a great and eager expectation stamped upon their smiling faces, which seems to have become the natural badge of all true Foursquare Gospellers.



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
