


God can turn the mark of interrogation into the mark of exclamation.

Facing the dawn of 1939, with its new untrodden ways, thousands will be wondering, "Where? How? Why?" But if God be with us, then ultimately the "Why?" will be changed to "Well!" His presence transforms problems into praises. Enumerating trials and tests in Luke xxi., Christ says concerning each, "It shall turn to you for a testimony." Apostle Paul proved this for he writes, "Wherever I go, thank God, He makes my life a constant pageant of triumph in Christ; diffusing the perfume of His knowledge everywhere by me" (II. Cor. ii. 14, Moffatt).

1939? Have we problems, queries, tests or trials? Let us be wise with our "Whys" and take them where Christ took His, when He cried, "My God, why—?"

Since every phase of human life is dealt with in God's Word, let us consider the experiences of some whose tests have been turned to testimonies. Are you, as Jacob, at the ford,





. . . I have seen thy face [Esau] as though I had seen the face of God." Prayer solves problems. A night with God changes Jacob's "How?" into "How He undertakes!"

Perhaps your problem is more like Job's than Jacob's. Is physical trouble your test? Then see the snapshot of this man from the land of Uz. He was great in character and in possessions. His home was known as "The Nest," and certainly it was well feathered. Satan, however, gained permission to test Job to the utmost limit of trial. Stripped of his stock, bereaved of his family, broken in health, feeling Godforsaken, Job cries in anguish of spirit, "I am escaped with the skin of my teeth " (Job xix. 20). It seemed as though the only part of his body left untouched by the enemy was that with which he could curse God. Job's comforters through mistaken conceptions of suffering, wrongly diagnosed the root cause of his trials, and consequently failed to find the remedy. "Miserable comforters are ye all," says Job, "Physicians of no value." Such quack doctors take no crooks out of the ??, but the Divine Physician solves the problem of suffering, causing Job to shout from the depths of distress, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." The resurrection will answer the riddles of to-day.

Interrogation without God-Exasperation. Interrogation with God-Exclamation. Why?—"God in the shadows,"—Well!

Perhaps your particular problem, however, is neither family trouble, as Jacob's, nor is it physical trouble, as

Yours might be a circumstantial test. wonder why you are placed in certain circumstances. Watch that dusky son of Africa now climbing the Hill of Calvary. The Bible narrative describes the scene thus: "And they compel one, Simon, a Cyrenian, who passed by, coming out of the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to bear His cross " (Mark xv. 21). Note, "As he passed by . . . coming out of the country." A burden was thrust upon him that day. Circumstances cast an unwelcome load upon his shoulders, for he was "compelled" to carry the cross. But tragedy was transformed to triumph. The very burden brought him side by side with the Son of God. Simon, compelled by force at the commencement of the Via Dolorosa, was surely compelled by love at the summit of Calvary's Hill. He transferred that cross to Christ, and in the light of Romans xvi. 13, we have reason to believe that he transferred his sins to His Redeemer too. You query your environment? It can bring you into intimate contact with Christ.

See, too, how seeming failure can be turned to success. On the awful night of our Lord's betrayal, a young man is aroused by the tread of troops. Having around him a linen cloth, he enters the Garden of Gethsemane, only to be seized as a suspected follower of the Nazarene. Fear overcoming shame, he flees naked for his life. Was that young man John Mark? Evidence suggests it was. Later he figures as a wouldbe missionary to the lawless heathen hill tribes of Asia Minor. But apparently fear causes him to return to Peter at Jerusalem. Yet God overrules seeming failure, for Mark, urged by Peter, and inspired by the Holy Ghost, writes his Gospel, enriching the world.

Not only individual, but national and international questions find their answers within the sacred page. Habakkuk was harassed as he beheld wrong ruling, and right being ruled out. But he took his secret problem to the secret place, and discovered that though God seemed silent, yet He was silently working out His wise plans and purposes, and Habakkuk, the doubting Thomas of the Old Testament, exclaimed, "The just shall live by faith . . . I will joy in the God of my salvation."

Individual, national, and international problems are only the outcome of the world-wide sin problem. All have sinned, but sinners have been redeemed by Christ's blood at Calvary. This is beautifully portrayed in the story of Gomer, Hosea's prodigal wife, who leaves her husband, and sinks deeply into sin. Eventually she is to be sold in the slave market, but God instructs Hosea to go to that market and redeem her. Three words are used in the New Testament meaning "To redeem ": Agorazo—to acquire at the forum; ex agorazo —to acquire out of the forum; lutroo—to loose by a price. Praise God, that in Christ, He came into the slave market, redeemed us with His blood out of the market, and set us gloriously free.

God can turn the mark of interrogation into the mark exclamation. Problems? Solved in Christ!

We Live in a Wonderful Age!

passes into history with all its series of crises, wars, and rumours of wars. The story of the frightful persecution of the Jews, hounded and chased from their homes, deprived of their livelihood, yet unable to leave the lands where they are being persecuted. China, Spain, Czecho-Slovakia-what a parade of frightfulness! The much-vaunted vision of the progress of man toward enlightenment and true civilisation is shattered before our very eyes.

I suppose we are all apt to get a little despondent at times when we see the trend of events, and we ask

ourselves whether we shall ever see that prayer come true that is so often on our lips, and which the Lord Jesus Himself taught us to pray: "Thy kingdom come."

We seem further away from the fulfilment of this prayer to-day than when our Victorian fathers uttered it. Dictatorship countries with their power politics seem to be swaying the world, and we are caught up in the wash of their rearmament policy. Fear dominates the hearts of men everywhere, while the leaders of the

nations cry peace with their lips, and with their hands

fashion engines of war.

You will be saying that the writer has surely forgotten the title of his article. No! I want to show you how these facts so strikingly coincide with the prophecy of Jesus concerning the last days, "Upon the earth,

DISTRESS OF NATIONS,

men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming upon the earth? (Luke xxi. 25, 26).

No journalist recording the happenings during the crisis so recently passed could give a more accurate account of the feelings of men all over the world as they gazed into what has been termed the "very mouth of hell." Fear caused them to cry out for peace, and drove this nation once again to her knees (would to God she would stay there); and yet to-day there is no feeling of security. Nations fill the press and the ether with violent recriminations, and go on arming—for security! With quavering voices we hear men saying "Peace?" God's Word says: "For when they shall say peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them." Mr. Chamberlain remarked when he returned from Munich that he hoped we should now have peace for our time; how rudely have these hopes been so quickly shattered. But Iesus says, "These things must first come to pass," and we are the people privileged to see the closing stages in this great drama of the nations marching on just as the

Lord prophesied; to-day we see the prophecy of Joel iii. 9 to 13 being fulfilled. "Proclaim ve this among the Gentiles; Prepare war, wake up the mighty men ... beat your plowshares into swords, and your pruning hooks into spears; . . . put ye in the sickle, for the harvest is ripe: come, get you down, for the press is full, the fats overflow; for their wickedness is great."

Shall we who

BELONG TO THE LORD

not remember that Jesus said: "When these things begin to come to pass, then look up, . . . for your redemption draweth nigh "?

Events are marching on apace! Signs are appearing on every hand that shout aloud that Jesus is soon coming!

One of the most wonderful signs is surely that of the deliverance of Jerusalem in 1917; exactly 2,520 years from the date when God gave the Promised Land into the hands of Nebuchadnezzar, viz., 604 B.C.

Since that date we have seen the prophecy of Isaiah lv. 13 fulfilled before our very eyes. "Instead of the thorn shall come up the fir tree, and instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle tree, and it shall be to the Lord for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off." This striking fulfilment must be apparent to the most casual observer. In the last twenty-two years Palestine has been transformed from a wilderness into a garden after 2,000 years of desolation!

Other signs mentioned by the Lord have been strikingly evident during this generation. Famines, earthquakes in divers places, pestilences. But space forbids more on this line.

The practical issue is, in the light of these events what are we doing about it? If, as we believe, the coming of the Lord is so near at hand, surely there should be some

NOTE OF URGENCY

in our work for the Master! 1939 marks yet another step towards the day when Jesus shall rapture the Church, when the burden of armaments under which the nations are now groaning will be loosed upon the peoples of the world; when the day of opportunity will be ended.

I feel sometimes when we come to the end of the old year and start the new that "turning over a new leaf" is almost a ritual with some people. All they do is to turn over and go to sleep again. We make resolutions, promising God we will do better in the year that is to come—it is all so futile, we so soon forget those good resolutions. But surely, here is an impetus that should keep us working seven days of every week, every month of the twelve that may lie before us in the coming year. Predicted signs have been fulfilled, they have passed into history, and soon, oh! so soon the end will be here.

Make your good resolutions by all means, revive a slackened prayer life, recommence that daily Bible reading, go out and win souls for Jesus, but keep the promise of the Lord's coming as a beacon light before you, warning, exhorting, and inspiring into a more earnest and sincere working for the Master. Don't lose the tent aspect; set up the altar and be ready to move off when Jesus comes, and you will not be left with sad regrets that you did not put into practice those good resolutions you made.

It is true that Jesus said, "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven," nevertheless, He has also said, "When ye see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors."

There is a Jewish legend which is quoted by Dr. A. J. Gordon in a splendid book, *Ecce Venit*, recently republished, which represents two venerable rabbis musing among the ruins of Jerusalem after its destruction. One is sadly bewailing saying, "Alas, alas! this is the end of all. Our beautiful city is no more, our Temple is laid waste, our brethren are driven away into captivity." But the other replies, "True, but let us learn from the verity of God's judgments which we behold about us, the certainty of His mercies. "BE OF GOOD CHEER,"

is with us to-day. "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble, therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea, though the waters thereof roar and be troubled, though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof . . . the Lord of hosts is with us." Pray on with fervent and believing heart: "Thy kingdom come." It will surely come.

Good Advice for the New Year

Trust in Him at all times.—Psalm 1xii. 8.

E stand at the threshold of another year. A New Year! How much is wrapped up in that single phrase! What unforeseen events, what mingled emotions, what infinite possibilities and boundless opportunities are hidden in that short period of twelve months! We would, if it were possible, peer into the future and learn what each of those three hundred and sixty-five days has in store for us. As we pass over this dividing line, between the past and the future, we cannot tell what new experiences and what changes shall come to us, nevertheless our hearts are cheered, yea gladdened, and our faith marches forward triumphantly, because we know and are assured that the Word of God has a message for every experience we may be called upon to pass through. And here is

an excellent piece of advice for the New Year: "Trust in Him at all times." Every moment of every day, as the months pass, let your faith rise in triumph unto God.

These words of Scripture present to us the One, and only One who is the right object of our trust and confidence. I find it impossible to agree with those who assert that it does not matter what a man believes so long as he believes in something. It matters a great deal, maybe far more than

some people imagine. A man is made by what he believes. The object of our trust shapes our character, determines our life and our destiny. Wesley relates the following circumstances: a poor woman of the Roman persuasion, having had the misfortune to break her china crucifix, immediately went to her priest to inform him, mourning greatly on account of the sad occurrence, and crying: "Now I have nothing but the great God to trust in." When Wesley repeated these words he appeared to be strangely moved, and in a manner peculiar to himself, exclaimed: "What a mercy she had a great God to trust in." Surely this is one of the truths of our Christian faith which causes an eternal hope to spring up within our breasts, "A great God to trust in." How many there are in the world who have broken idols. Those in whom they trusted have bitterly and cruelly deceived and disappointed them. We are warned against these false objects of trust. Put your trust in the great God of heaven and earth; others may fail you, earthly friends may forsake you, but this Friend will never leave you, nor deceive you.

Were I asked to make a list of the Psalmist's favourite words, I would certainly include the word "trust." He never seems to get away from it. It is one of the conspicuous words that

ADORN THE SACRED PAGE.

How many and varied were the meanings that David conveyed by the word "trust." For example: trust means to take refuge. Often this man of God was surrounded by dangers and difficulties, and he found refuge in trusting in his God. "The name of the Lord is a

strong tower; the righteous runneth into it and is safe." Thrice blessed are we when we have the Lord as our refuge and fortress. "Thou blest Rock of Ages, I'm hiding in Thee." At another time it gives the idea of support. There are people who are weak and not able to walk very well and they often receive support by leaning on another's arm. We sing in one of our hymns about "leaning on Jesus." The cheering thought about our Lord is that He offers us His arm every hour of every day. How blessed to be conscious of the everlasting arms of Jesus supporting and upholding us daily!

Continuing this piece of advice, we are told when to trust. "At all times,"—and remember he who uttered these words was a man of fluctuating experiences, but he had found that making God the object of his trust worked well in his own life, and so passed it on to us. He knew what it was to live in the sunlight and then pass through the shadows. Pleasure and pain triumph and tears were his. But here is the prescription he had for

EVERY CIRCUMSTANCE OF LIFE,

"Trust in Him at all times." We are not told to trust only when our days are bright and our lives are filled with the goodness of God, days when our dreams are realised and all goes well. That would be trusting God sometimes. How different life would be if we would act upon this advice in the hour of temptation. There is no other way by which we can be delivered and gain the victory over Satan, save by trusting in Jesus. In the day of reproach, when it becomes increasingly difficult to live for the Lord Jesus, when the storms of adversity and opposition blow upon us, our trust is the anchor that keeps our soul. In the time of uncertainty, what a blessed thing it is to know the Lord and place our trust in Him. I know of no better example of this than the one we have given to us by Job. He knew what it was to trust God in his good days, he also knew what it was to trust God in his dark days. Think of that ever-memorable declaration, made at an hour when he was surrounded by calamity, "Though He slay me yet will I trust Him."

In this confidence let us begin the New Year, and we shall find, like millions that have gone before us, that our God in whom we trust will not fail nor forsake.

He goes before! Be this my consolation; He goes before! On this my heart would dwell! He goes before! This guarantees salvation; He goes before! And therefore all is well.

The Scripture Union Daily Portion:

Sunday, January 8th. I. Chron. xii. 23-40.

" Of Zebulun . . . fifty thousand, which could keep rank, they were not of double heart" (verse 33).

What a testimony! Would to God that this could be said of all in our churches up and down the land. Can we keep rank? Are we of one mind and one heart, ready to obey the word of our Captain? How often we find the Christian likened to a soldier. We wear the King's uniform, we have declared our allegiance to Him, we have volunteered our services to fight His battles. Then comes the drilling: learning to stand upright, to march in step, to take aim with a rifle. How the Lord puts us through similar experiences that we may be upright in character, that we may know how to maintain fellowship with our brethren in oneness, that we may know how to use His Word with effect! These men of Zebulun were also right at heart. Remember that our Captain is called " Faithful and True"; let us have His Spirit.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For showers of Latter Rain outpouring in our Elim Churches to-day.

Monday, January 9th. I. Chron. xiil.

"And they carried the ark of God in a new cart" (verse 7).

There is a wonderful lesson for us in this portion of Scripture. It is not a question of how much we sing and shout, but are we doing things according to the Word of the Lord? The men of Israel might have thought that they were honouring God by building a specially new cart on which to carry His ark. It is here we see that ignorance does not excuse us. They ought to have known that the ark of God was not to be taken on a new cart at all, but to be borne on the shoulders of the Levites. We see many new carts to-day by which men are trying to carry on the work of the Lord, but let our message be: "Back to the Bible." Get your shoulders under it, ye sons of Levi; take the work of God on your hearts, carry it to the throne of grace, and God will help you as He helped the Levites (chapter xv. 26) after they had learned their lesson.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Special prayer for international peace and the extension of Christ's Kingdom in all countries.

Tuesday, January 10th. I. Chron. xiv. 8-17.

"When thou shalt hear a sound of going in the tops of the mulberry trees, then thou shalt go out to battle " (v. 15). David had learned that the secret of

success lay in implicitly following the commands of the Lord. He not only went out to battle when the Lord commanded him, but he went out to battle in the way in which the Lord commanded him. He received from God his mode of attack. O that we had learned this secret of success like David! When we go forth to win souls for Christ, to wait on the Lord to show us just how to go about it, to look to Him for the right words, to go forth in the right spirit, and especially to listen for the sound of going in the tops of the mulberry trees: then it is that the Lord has gone forth before us. When the gentle breeze of the Spirit begins to move in our souls, then it is time to get on the march. What an awful thing if David had then held back through fear! What would God have thought of him?

PRAYER TOPIC:

For God's blessing on lecturers and students during the new term of the Elim Bible College commencing to-day.

Wednesday, January 11th. I. Chron. xv. 25-29; xvi. 1-6.

" The ark of the covenant of the Lord came to the city of David " (verse 29).

The city of David was the proper place for the ark. It was never intended to be the private possession of any individual or family. Truly it brought blessing to the house of Obed-edom, but God intended it to be in the place where it might bring blessing to all Israel. We as members of the Church of Christ, standing for the whole counsel of God, have long enjoyed the covenant blessings of the Lord in the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, but although it has meant a mighty blessing to us we are willing to step into the great procession and join with all the other members of the Church of Christ to help them bring up this ark of God into the midst of the dwelling place of the Son of David. Like Obed-edom (xv. 24) we are willing to act as door-keepers for the ark. But these, our brethren, must be willing to humble themselves, to dispense with their new carts, and take this ark of God on their shoulders, get under the burden of it, feel the weight of it, and then with joy and rejoicing we will watch it going up to its place.

PRAYER TOPIC:
The touch of Christ to rest upon those seeking healing for their bodies.

Thursday, January 12th. I. Chron. xvi.

"He suffered no man to do them wrong" (verse 21).

How tenderly the Lord cares for His people! In all their movements His eye was steadily upon them. But I hear

someone exclaim: "Listen to what Paul has to say: ' For Thy sake we are killed all the day long; we are accounted as sheep for the slaughter.'" Yes, but he goes on to show that we in this gospel dispensation have something far exceeding that which men enjoyed under the old covenant. Observe his glorious contradiction of what men look upon as outward defeat. "Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us." Truly that must be divine which can triumph and be accounted victorious under such circumstances. Yes, our God still watches over us, if I might say so, more closely than ever, and takes an eternal interest in our training, in our perfecting, that we might be partakers of His holiness, made ready to sit with Christ on His throne and govern the universe with Him.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Thanksgiving for the faithfulness of many of God's stewards.

Friday, January 13th, I. Chron, xvi.

"Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness " (verse 29).

This is the only kind of worship that is acceptable to God. There is indeed a beauty in holiness. It is moral righteousness. It is that attitude of mind and heart which only desires to do that which is right in the sight of God and man: to do that which is right by your neighbour; to do that which is right toward the Lord. And why should not everyone desire to do this? What is there wrong in God requiring this? What else could He require? He could neither require more nor less and remain an object of worship. " Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."

PRAYER TOPIC:

Blessing upon the prison work of the London Crusader Choir.

Saturday, January 14th. I. Chron. xvii.

" As David sat in his house" (verse 1).

I can picture David sitting down by the open window of his palace, looking out over his royal garden, and quietly beginning to meditate on all the way the Lord has led him: how He has fought for him time and time again, how He has blessed his kingdom, his family, and all that he has; and looking around he praises God also for this his beautiful house of cedars. Then his heart smites him: he realises that he has never built a house for the ark of God-it remains in a tent! But the Lord is watching on. and pleased to see into David's heart and to note all his ponderings. Then the Lord begins to tell David some of the great things He is still going to do for him, and for his seed after him. And although God saw fit that David should not build the Temple, yet that gracious thought in David's heart concerning the house of God was very precious in the eyes of the Lord, and came up before Him as sweet incense.

Notes of an Itinerary

T was our first visit to Scotland, so we looked forward with interest to meeting the Scottish Foursquare brethren. On the way from London we got off at Sheffield and enjoyed a short stay with Pastor and Mrs. A. S. Thorne. Pastor Thorne dedicated his life to the service of the Lord at one of our missionary meetings in the early days before we went to Mexico. We held a splendid meeting at the Sheffield Foursquare Church. The brethren there are enthusiastic and have a warm heart for foreign missions. The Missionary Band at this church had a pleasant surprise for us, and during the service the secretary of the band came to the front and handed us £5 which they had gathered together among themselves as their special contribution to help spread the Foursquare Gospel in other lands. God bless the Sheffield Foursquare Missionary Band! This first meeting was a happy one and we were made to feel quite at home among the Sheffield saints.

The next day we had to take leave of Pastor and Mrs. Thorne for the rather long journey to Greenock, our first stopping place in Scotland. There a very happy week-end of fellowship was spent with Pastor and Mrs. Magee. The first meeting in Greenock was on the Saturday night and we were surprised to see more than 250 people turn out for this meeting. It was

to these Scottish saints and to feel the right warm welcome extended to us. Sunday morning was spent in praise and worship around the Lord's table and we learned that our Scottish brethren delight in these times of worship when the human voice is hushed and we listen to the voice of our Lord and Master. Sunday evening there were some 600 people present and it was a privilege to minister the Word of God and relate some little of the work of the Lord in poor, war-stricken Spain. We left Greenock with fond memories of Pastor and Mrs. Magee and the people to whom they minister.

.The next place of call was Kilsyth, and here we were told of some historic places in and around the town dating back to the days of the Covenanters, and while speaking at the meeting there we felt something of the spirit of those Scottish Christian warriors who fought and died rather than submit to those who would rob them of their right to worship as their conscience dictated. The visit to Kilsyth was short, yet very blessed.

As the itinerary had been pre-arranged, we had to move on speedily to Edinburgh, the next place on the list. Edinburgh is a beautiful city and Pastor and Mrs. J. R. Knight very kindly took us to see some of the most interesting places. Among these was the house where

From Edinburgh we travelled to Dunfermline where we have a body of faithful believers being shepherded by Pastor E. C. Jones. Here too we found keen interest in missionary work and a longing to know more about the triumphs of the Cross of Christ in Spain.

On we go, this time to Aberdeen, the most northerly point of our tour. Pastor John Hill is in charge of the Church there. Our stay was just for one night and as there was a lot to say and a short time in which to say it we got busy. The interior of the Aberdeen church is just beautiful and credit is due to those concerned, but as the building does not make the Church, we are more concerned with the "living stones" in the Church and we are glad to find that Aberdeen Foursquare Christians are no exception to the rule, but really are "living stones." Sunday morning finds us again around the Lord's table and it thrills us to see such a large company of people met together on the Lord's Day morning to remember His death.

Sunday evening's service is a monster gathering; there must be 600 to 700 people present. What a privilege to address such a gathering! The presence of the Lord is very real and there is great liberty in speaking, and as we hear about the oppression, bondage, and need of Spain, we again thank God that our forefathers in this country had enough backbone to stand and fight for these liberties that we now enjoy. We are in the train again and this time on our way

although it is a Crusader meeting in the ordinary course of events, the church is well filled and we are again privileged to put before our brethren the needs of


THOSE OTHER SHEEP

THE UNKNOWN TO-MORROW

A NEW YEAR MESSAGE.

By the late Dr. Alexander Maclaren

It is not for you to know the times or the seasons, which the Father hath put in His own power.

THE New Testament gives little encouragement to a sentimental view of life. Its writers had too much to do, and too much besides to think about, for undue occupation with pensive remembrances or imaginative forecastings. They bid us look forward, but not along the low levels of earth and its changes. Mist and cloud conceal the path in front of the portion which we are actually traversing, but when it climbs, it comes out clear from the fogs that hang about the flats. We can track it winding up to the throne of Christ. Nothing is certain, but the coming of the Lord and "our gathering together to Him."

The words of this text in their original meaning point only to the ignorance of the time of the end which Christ had been foretelling. But they may allow of a much wider application, and their lessons are in entire consonance with the whole tone of Scripture in regard to the future. They teach us the limits of our care for the future, as they give us the limits of our knowledge of it. They teach us the best remedies for all anxiety, the great thoughts that tranquillize us in our ignorance, viz., that all is in God's merciful hands, and that whatever may come, we have a divine power which will fit us for it; and they bid us anticipate our work and do it, as the best counterpoise for all vain curiosity about what may be

COMING ON THE EARTH.

1. The narrow limits of our knowledge of the future.

We are sure that a mingled web of joy and sorrow, light shot with dark, will be unrolled before us—but of anything more we are really ignorant. We know that the great majority of us will be alive at the close of this year; but who will be the exceptions? A great many of us will go on substantially as we have been going on for years past, with our ordinary duties, joys, sorrows, cares; but to some of us, in all probability, this year holds some great change which may darken all our days or brighten them. In all our forward-looking there ever remains an element of uncertainty. The future fronts us like some statue beneath its canvas covering. Rolling mists hide it all, except here and there a peak.

I need not remind you how merciful and good it is that it is so. Therefore coming sorrows do not diffuse anticipatory bitterness as of tainted water percolating through gravel, and coming joys are not discounted, and the present has a reality of its own, and is not

coloured by what is to come.

Our future we may contemplate. Our fault is not that we look forward, but that we do not look far enough forward. Why trouble with the world when we have heaven? Why look along the low level among the mists of earth and forests and swamps, when we can see the road

CLIMBING TO THE HEIGHTS?

Why be anxious about what three hundred and sixtyfive days may bring, when we know what eternity will bring? Why divert our God-given faculties of hope from its true object? Why torment ourselves with casting the fashion of uncertain evils, when we can enter into the great peace of looking for "that blessed Hope"?

2. The Safe Hands which keep the future.

"The Father hath put in His own power." We have not to depend upon an impersonal Fate; nor upon a wild whirl of Chance; nor upon "laws of averages," "natural laws," "tendencies," and "spirit of the age"; nor even on a theistic Providence, but upon a Father who holds all things "in His own power," and wields all for us. So will not our way be made right?

Whatever the future may bring, it will be a loving, paternal discipline. He shapes it all and keeps it in His hands. Why should we be anxious? That great name of "Father" binds Him to tender, wise, disciplinary dealing, and should move us to calm and

happy trust.

3. The sufficient strength to face the future.

"The power of the Holy Ghost coming upon you" is promised here to the disciples for a specific purpose; but it is promised and given to us all through Christ, if we will only take it. And in Him we shall be ready for all the future.

The Spirit of God is the true

INTERPRETER OF PROVIDENCE.

He calms our nature, and enlightens our understanding to grasp the meaning of all our experiences. The Spirit makes joy more blessed, by keeping us from undue absorption in it. The Spirit is the Comforter. The Spirit fits us for duty.

So be quite sure that nothing will come to you in your earthly future, which He does not Himself accompany to interpret, and to make ourse bloosing.

pany to interpret, and to make pure blessing.

4. The practical duty in view of the future.

The great thing we ought to look to in the future is our work—not what we shall or what we shall not endure, but what we shall do. This is healthful and calming.

The great remedy for morbid anticipation lies in regarding life as the opportunity for service. Never mind about the future, let it take care of itself. Work! That clears away cobwebs from our brains, as when a man wakes from troubled dreams, to hear "the sweep of scythe in morning dew," and the shout of the peasant as he trudges to his task, and the lowing of the cattle, and the clink of the hammer.

The great work we have to do in the future is to be witnesses for Christ. This is the meaning of all life; we can do it in joy and in sorrow, and we shall bear a charmed life till it be done. So the words

of the text are a promise of preservation.

Then, dear brethren, how do you stand fronting that unknown? How can you face it without going mad? If you know God and trust Him as your Father through Christ you need have no fear. To-morrow lies all dim and strange before you, but His gentle

and strong hand is working in the darkness and He will shape it right. He will fit you to bear it all. If you regard it as your supreme duty and highest honour to be Christ's witness, you will be kept safe, "delivered out of the mouth of the lion," that by you "the preaching may be fully known."

If not, how dreary is that future to you, " all dim

and cheerless, like a rainy sea," from which wild shapes may come up and devour you! Love and friendship will pass, honour and strength will fail, life will ebb away, and of all that once stretched before you, nothing will be left but one little strip of sand, fast jellying with the tide beneath your feet, and before you a wild, unlighted ocean!

Able to Save—Able to Keep

R UPERT JARRETT picked up the paper his wife had handed him, and read with the title of an article on the first page—"Able to Save—Able to Keep."

"Thank God, He is able to do both!" he exclaimed, a note of conviction in his voice. "If anyone should doubt it, Quentin Kerr is a standing monument to the truth of that statement."

Before the week was out, poor Quentin had broken his pledge, and once more well-nigh broken his mother's heart.

With almost a fire in his brain he went to his mother, and with Godgiven wisdom she led him to the feet of Jesus. "I heard him tell his story one night before a crowded audience, and never shall I forget the look on his face as he said: 'What the blood of my dear mother could not do, the blood of Jesus Christ has accomplished. Why the Titanic Sank

HE world is full of tragedies of unheeded warnings. One of the greatest was the sinking of the *Titanic* with the loss of 1,517 lives.

In a book entitled "S.O.S," by Karl Baarslag, published by Methuen, Mr. Baarslag recalls that

on April 15th, 1912, at 10.21 p.m., the Leyland liner California was stopped by field ice not more than 20 miles from where the *Titanic* went down a few hours later.

Evans, the radio operator of the California, tried to tell Phillips, his opposite number on the Titanic, of the fact about 11 p.m., but Phillips "was busy copying messages from Cape Race, and Evans, being so much nearer, and having a broad spark note, naturally interfered."

Evans, says the author, was told by Phillips to "shut up," and Phillips then told Cape Race that he had just been jammed by the *California*, and to resume traffic.

Evans listened for a few minutes to the stream of messages passing from Cape Race to the *Titanic*, and then went to bed.

It was nearly midnight; he had been on duty 16 hours; his ship was stopped; there was nothing for him to do.

If he had kept his earphones on ten or fifteen minutes longer he would have heard the *Titanic's* S.O.S. after she struck the iceberg which sent her to the bottom.

No blame or reproach could attach to Evans. He had been on duty for sixteen hours, and in those days no relief man was carried by ships. He had tried to convey his warning of danger ahead and Phillips had failed to receive it or to give ear to it because he was too busy. The warning was unheeded and later as a result the call of the Titanic's S.O.S. was unheeded by the only ship that could have saved the lives of all on board. At 11.40 p.m. the look-out man on the Titanic saw the ice ahead, 37 seconds later she struck. The shock was so slight that passengers who were still up hardly noticed it and some even went on deck, saw nothing and returned to their game of cards. So swiftly did she sink that the mail room which was twenty-four feet above the water-line was awash in twenty minutes and at. 2.20 a.m. the Titanic sank.

Individuals may turn a deaf ear or be too busy to hear the warning note of the gospel; communities may return to their gambling and be lulled to slumber by the word "unsinkable," but as surely as that palace of steel sank to the bottom like a stone, so the ship of state—of individual as well as collective security—is in peril because of the open disregard for God's Word,

To those who know the truth the call is more insistent than ever that whether they will hear, or whether they will forbear, both in season and out of season, we must preach the Word.—P.N.C.

Fellowship Time


This week we are commencing a new series of special interest to members of the Fellowship Links, in which we hope to introduce them to some of their fellow-members.

CRUICKSHANK OF CALABAR. By Alexander Gammie.

(Pickering & Inglis, Ltd. 2/6, by post 2/10).
From Aberdeen to Africa! From the quiet atmosphere of the parish "Kirk" to a region where idolatry, infanticide, human sacrifice, and all manner of depravity held sway. This was the experience of Dr. Alexander Cruickshank. Never such a popular figure in his lifetime as Mary Slessor, his fellowworker, but one whose work during the fifty-five years spent in Calabar was just as wonderful. This record of Cruickshank's life and ministry inspires, and furnishes one further proof of the triumph of Christ over all kinds of evil.-JOHN HILL.

DANIEL, THE GREATLY BELOVED. By. G. W. West. (Marshall, Morgan & Scott, Ltd. 2/6, by post 2/9).

There are interesting points and discussions in this book, but on the whole it is quite ordinary. The author is very hesitant on many points. We unhesitatingly allow that if there is indecision in one's own mind then a decisive view-point should not be expressed, but when the indecision is frequent we wonder whether one is justified in writing a book.

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
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
