Easter Monday at the Royal Albert Hall

The Fourteenth (1926-39) Elim Demonstration

S one who has been privileged to attend all the wonderful services at the Royal Albert Hall since the first gathering on that memorable Easter of 1926, and to have taken a humble part in them, I can fairly claim to be a competent judge of the glorious Easter Monday of 1939. The day dawned full of sunlight and warmth—a foretaste of spiritual blessing to our souls.

The doors of the great building opened at 10 a.m. to admit the general public, but long before this hour the Elim organisation which so efficiently controls a thousand details to ensure the comfort and safety of the people who attend the meetings, was humming like a beehive. "There was a place for everything, and everything was in its place." Good humour, the outcome of willing service for the Master, radiated from the army of brothers and sisters who were determined to do everything in their power to make the day a success, in whatever sphere their services were needed.

Willingness to serve in any capacity is, from my particular point of view, one of the outstanding features of men and women in the Elim movement, who fully realise that their Master was the most ready of all to serve—even unto death.

Punctuality is insisted upon, and sharp at 10 a.m. "the rush" begins. Many visitors have

COME FOR THE FIRST TIME,

and their anxiety to be piloted through the maze of corridors to their seats is natural enough! The well-trained ushers deal with their "quick-firing" questions with love and sympathy, and they soon learn the geography of what is perhaps one of the most complicated public buildings in the world. They are, however, as quick in finding their way about as they were in grasping the way of salvation as preached by our beloved Principal and Elim ministers. The "older hands" are already familiar with their surroundings, and I find year by year that these dear ones are a great help in guiding newcomers. It is most interesting to listen to the various dialects. One can detect the soft, easy-flowing words from those who live amid

the glorious South-west. They mingle with the plainspeaking cockney. The broad Midland language is quite at home with the closely-clipped conversation of the North, and there is no need to wonder from which part of the Kingdom come those musical voices. All somewhat different in the natural, but praise God, all one in Christ Jesus our Lord! Hallelujah!

THE MORNING SERVICE

was attended by perhaps the greatest congregation for many years. It was an inspiring sight to see the audience respond as Principal George Jeffreys took charge of the meeting, after Pastor Darragh had directed the chorus singing. The Crusader Choir was again under the leadership of Pastor Douglas Gray, and gave its joyous message in songs of praise and adoration, accompanied on the great organ by our brother, Mr. R. Cooper. Tense was the atmosphere as the Principal asked for a moment of silent prayer for the guidance of the British Cabinet, who at that precise moment were deliberating matters vitally affecting the Nation and Empire. It will need little imagination on the part of the reader to realise what a sense of deep quietness reigned as the thousands present observed absolute stillness. Then the silence was broken by the Principal, in the reverent manner we know so well, as he commenced the opening strains of "O God, our help in ages past." The hymn was taken up by the people, and sung with a sincerity of voice rarely heard in such a gathering.

After the preaching of the Word in power by our beloved leader, thirty-five souls found the way of life through Calvary.

Then followed the Divine Healing service during which several hundreds were

ANOINTED WITH OIL

in accordance with James v. 14. Scores of those prayed with came under the mighty power of God, and many testimonies of healing were given to those in charge. Praise the Lord!

In the afternoon Pastors Edsor and Darragh taught

the congregation a chorus, most appropriate for the day:

He lives! He lives!
Christ Jesus lives to-day:
He walks with me,
He talks with me,
Along life's narrow way.
He lives! He lives!
Salvation to impart.
You ask me how I know He lives?
He lives within my heart!

We also had inspired singing by the London Crusader Choir, and a solo by Mr. James Sparrow entitled, "The Stranger of Galilee."

The burden of Principal George Jeffreys' address was "The Seven-branched Candlestick," and so mightily did the Lord bless the presentation of this word that twenty souls surrendered to the great unchanging Friend and Saviour.

At the Baptismal service which followed, the Principal immersed about seventy brothers and sisters who desired to follow their blessed Lord.

I shall not readily forget the great sea of faces at the evening Communion service. The great auditorium was nearly crowded to capacity, and the congregation was reverent and expectant. Telegrams of greeting were received and read out: these included one from His Majesty the King, thanking his subjects in the Royal Albert Hall for their loyal greeting. The National Anthem was sung immediately afterwards with deep feeling. The Principal also read out messages from about a dozen other Elim Conventions in

the British Isles and one from brethren in Switzerland.

A specially telling incident was a request from the Principal to the thousands of people in the balcony

TO REPEAT THE LORD'S PRAYER.

It was wonderful to listen to all those voices high up in the building, clearly and distinctly repeating the words which our Master taught when on earth, and which we all love so deeply.

A much-appreciated item by the choir was the excellent rendering of a piece entitled "Temples of the Spirit," the solos being taken by Miss B. Tetchner and Mr. James Sparrow. Pastor P. N. Corry sang a beautiful solo which embodied an invitation to the child of God to be filled with the Spirit for life and service. This was much appreciated.

Then the Principal rose and unfolded from God's Word a picture of the "Framework of the First House of God." Vividly he portrayed the wonder of Divine truths which never change. Twenty-four souls found room in God's spiritual house at this service, making seventy-nine for the day. Hallelujah!

The Communion service was once again a garden of spiritual memories, garlanded with trophies of grace, anticipating the great union in glory. Our hearts burned within us at the prospect.

We left the Royal Albert Hall after a happy day, carrying away in our hearts the knowledge that the risen Christ was with His people.

Loyal Foursquare Gospellers Invade Premier Hall

OOD gracious!" I exclaimed to my wife the other day, "this announcement in the Evangel makes me begin to feel quite ancient." I was glancing through the advertisement of the Royal Albert Hall Easter meetings, and noticed that this year we were to hold the 17th Easter Convention, and the 14th in the Royal Albert Hall. Naturally my mind drifted (in imagination!) to the early days of the Foursquare fellowship. Then, we gathered in the Clapham Tabernacle. From there we went to the Surrey Tabernacle to accommodate the growing congregations; and now the premier hall in Britain has proved too small to accommodate the thousands of joyful Christians who desire to spend Eastertide among the people of God. Conventions are held in most of the big cities, and the telegrams read during the day were proof of the loving link which exists throughout this great family.

Never before, however, had we gathered

UNDER SUCH STRAINED CONDITIONS

As the Principal reminded us in the course of his addresses, all around us war clouds were gathering and men's hearts were failing them for fear. There was a possibility that this might prove to be an eventful convention for many who had gathered. We began to sing:

Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, Whose mind is stayed on Thee.

Yes, in a world of bitterness, fear, and strife, we

were at peace in God. The Principal made reference to the digging of trenches at the time of the last crisis, pointing out the greater security of the believer, in the Lord.

It will be impossible to give a full description of the whole day's activities, so I propose to write down one or two impressions. If we split the report up under various headings, as the old school of preachers would divide up their sermons, we may be able to get some idea of the meetings. These are the headings:

The People.

The Preacher.

The Performance.

The Piety.

The People. They came from all over the country, homely folk, happy, and anxious to join in another year's celebrations. They jostled one another good humouredly in the corridors and tea rooms, they sang in the services as well and lustily as lungs would allow, they entered into direct fellowship with God—for though they might be dressed in the homely garb of ordinary citizens, here was a company of kings and princes of a royal house, the members of a holy nation. 
take place on this great day! Someone from somewhere meets someone else from somewhere else.

The Performance. I hope this word will not suggest a merely staged affair. By performance I mean the general happenings of the day. In the morning the sick friends were prayed for. In the afternoon about seventy believers were baptised. In the evening, the vast assembly gathered round the Lord's Table. The musical items were very good.

a satisfaction it must be to the Founder of such a work, to see the joy this movement has brought into so many lives.

The Preacher. The Principal is well known to most readers of the Evangel, and it would be superfluous to attempt a description of his methods and style. All the messages during the day were taken from the types of the Old Testament—the Tabernacle, the seven-branched Candlestick, and the Boards of the Holy Place. His preaching was particularly vigorous, emphasising the need for our nation to return to its adherence to the Word of God. By a strong appeal for the practical life, the individual Christian was urged to a deeper life of separation and service. As is usual in these meetings, an appeal was made after each message, and nearly eighty souls raised their hands to signify their desire to accept Christ as a personal Saviour.

The Principal also paid a touching tribute to those friends who had passed on before. Several of the faithful brethren who have assisted at previous demonstrations are now with the Lord, also our dear and a freshness added by the introduction of new talent. The usual telegrams were sent out, one to their Majesties the King and Queen, and others to the Foursquare gatherings in the Provinces. Loyalty is not lacking, for no patriotic gathering of Imperialists could sing the National Anthem with greater enthusiasm, or more sincere prayer for God's blessing on our Monarch.

The Piety. Many critics of the mass meetings try to belittle the value of the great Communion services held from year to year, by telling us how impossible it is to create a spiritual atmosphere. Those who attend them, however, know that all who honour Christ at the Table of the Lord, receive His blessing, whether there be ten or ten thousand saints present. These blessed services are proof that such forms of worship are well worth while.

And now I must put the pen aside. As I read the article over, it seems rather disappointing, but I am already keeping the editor waiting. If this description fails to do justice to the day's meetings, then come for yourself next year, if the Lord tarry!

"The Day" in Retrospect

O the wonderful day has ended, and the Fourteenth Annual Demonstration has come and gone. The last farewell has been said, and the Elim family has scattered once again to the four quarters of the Kingdom.

Imperial Institute Road became a car park for the occasion, with forty or more coaches drawn up in line, bearing the names of half the principal towns of the realm. Some had started with the earliest dawn—though even then they were outstripped by the Irish friends, who had perforce to travel all night.

But all fatigue was swept away with the first grand chorus, "He lives! Christ Jesus lives to-day!"

On the ground of mere numbers, surely something must be said for a Church which can in these days hold such an audience on Easter Monday for fourteen years in succession. "Mass religion," it has been contemptuously called. Well, why not? The Royal Albert Hall has seen 10,000 people gather for a much less worthy object than was ours to-day. Was not the witness of our very presence in itself a challenge? In any case

to care over-much for the cavillers!

Nevertheless, we were aware from the outset that we had gathered for a service, rather than a plain demonstration. We were sincere and fervent in our worship, though onlookers might have called us emotional. We are well used to that—though the accusation comes oddly from a world that will accept the emotions and ecstasies of a Santa Teresa or a St. Catherine! 15,000 people in the Square of St. Peter's at Rome recently burst out into the spontaneous singing of the Te Deum, and everybody thought it wonderful. If Foursquare Gospellers prefer to sing (not chant) "Up from the grave He arose!" till the very roof rings again, surely we do well? We sing because we love Him, sincerely and unshamedly.

The great dome suddenly hushed for prayer, and we thought of those dozen or so men meeting not far away in Whitehall even as we prayed. We asked very fervently that the Divine guidance might be theirs.

Who can explain the wonderful "real presence" of the risen Lord in such a gigantic prayer meeting? Certainly the writer cannot; but as the meeting proceeded, certain familiar lines of Tennyson's came insistently to mind:

Speak to Him, thou, for He hears, and Spirit with spirit can meet;
Closer is He than breathing, nearer than hands or feet.

Our minds went back to other days and other way

Our minds went back to other days and other ways as we looked on those

TIERS UPON TIERS OF CROWDED SEATS.

If Principal Jeffreys had done no more than bring joy back into religion for many, he would still have deserved well of his fellows. No fixed professional piety here! Our way may not be that of others—we do not condemn: but to us it is very really *The* Way—is not that enough?

Each succeeding year seems to centre around one special motif. "Called to Separation" was the theme of one of the most beautiful of the Easter choir pieces, and that was also the heart of the Principal's ministry throughout the day. We shall not soon forget the vivid presentation of the Lord walking in the midst of the Seven Lampstands. We saw the Lord Jesus trimming the wicks, and we blessed God for the faithful word, and the fearless naming of the things which defile.

During the three meetings of the day, about eighty men and women gave their lives to Christ, and in their hearts echoed with us the choir's song:

> Step by step with Jesus, all along life's way: Now the cross and conflict, then the perfect day.

Following the morning worship, there came the two ordinances for which Elim is now famous in Easter Tuesday's newspapers—the anointing and prayer for the sick, and the baptising in water of sixty-nine believers. In twenty-four years Elim has been built up under Divine blessing on the solid scriptural basis of a literal obedience to commandment. We affirm—and the Principal emphasised it again in his ministry of the Word—that if we accept the Bible at all as authority, we must accept it all. For us, James v. is of equal authority with Matthew xxviii. 19, and Mark xvi. must have its place in any truly-ordered church life.

And so on to the

CULMINATING SERVICE OF THE DAY,

and one which never fails to awaken a strange thrill in even the eldest among us. Much organisation had gone to the smooth working of the arrangements for the great Communion service. All was so quiet, so reverent, so holy, and withal so absolutely simple. Pastors Phillips, Hathaway, and Boulton stepped down quietly into the arena and stood before the laden communion table—nearly ten thousand of us were to feast at our Master's Table this night! Quietly a signal was given, and quietly the hundred or more ushers came filing down the gangways—a most moving sight from the platform. Quietly they partook of the simple elements themselves, and equally quietly they came in turn to us. We lost all sight of the ordering of the service, in the very real communion with our dearest Saviour. Not a trace of disorder, but a vast audience lost in worship and praise.

And with that Pisgah-view of our heavenly Hometo-be, and that blessed foretaste of the fellowship of all the redeemed, we left the great building.

Shall we ever gather there again?—or will our next summons be that for which the Church has long prayed? "Even so, come quickly, Lord Jesus!"

"Why transgress the Lord's commandment, for by so doing you say goodbye to prosperity?" Resurrection Power

In a cemetery at Hanover, Germany, there is a grave on which great slabs of granite and marble were piled, cemented together and fastened with steel clasps. It is the grave of a woman who did not believe that Jesus Christ rose from the dead, nor that she or anyone else would live again after death. In her will she ordered her grave to be made secure so that if there were a resurrection of the dead, it could not reach her. On the stone these words were engraved: " burial place must never be opened."

A little seed, however, chanced to be covered over by the stone, and, beginning to grow, it tried to find its way to the light. You would not think a little growing plant could wrench those steel clasps from their sockets and burst the cemented stone slabs, but it did. That little seed has become a full-grown tree, and the great stones have fallen over to give it room.

Caiaphas and other enemies of Jesus thought that when the tomb in which His body had been laid was made secure and it could not be opened, but the power of God that worked through a little seed in Hanover, worked in a more marvellous way to open that tomb near Jerusalem.

Example

A little son had, without his father's permission, followed him up a steep and dangerous mountain climb. At a particularly difficult point in the path he made his presence known by calling out: "Step carefully, papa, for I am coming in your footsteps!"



Testimonies of Eye-witnesses to the value of the Pentecostal Experience

I. INTRODUCTION AND BIBLICAL EXAMPLES.

By Pastor P. N. CORRY

HERE is no denying that the early Church was formed during a period of intense spiritual manifestation. Spiritual gifts were much in evidence: visions, dreams, and trances are mentioned time and time again in the Book of the Acts, and that not by the humbler members of the Church, but by the leaders.

The Day of Pentecost was ushered in by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and the speaking in tongues which accompanied it (Acts ii.). The command to Philip the deacon, while in Samaria, to go down to Gaza, led to the earliest move of the gospel to men of an alien race (Acts viii. 26-39). Peter's threefold vision when in a trace was the immediate cause of opening the door of faith to the Gentiles (Acts x.). A message through the prophet Agabus was the fountain-head of all Christian charity (Acts xi. 28-30). Paul's trance in the Temple prepared him for the lifework which was to make him the Apostle of the Gentiles (Acts xxii. 17-21)—not to speak of the many others which are mentioned in his life story. But it is unnecessary to continue and add to the list: even a superficial reading of the New Testament

WILL PROVE THE CASE

It is also true to say that the early Churches themselves were not only born during seasons of spiritual manifestation, but continued to enjoy them, and did not expect these things to die out or to cease after the apostles had moved on. Paul thanked God that the testimony of Christ was confirmed to the Church at Corinth and that they came behind in no gift "waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ," who, says Paul, "shall also confirm you unto the end." (I. Cor. i. 4-9). The Church looked for the ministry of the gospel to be attested "by mighty signs and wonders in the power of the Spirit of God " (Rom. xv. 17-19), and this was not only true of Paul but of the other apostles, whose word was witnessed "both with signs and wonders and divers miracles and gifts of the Holy Ghost " (Heb. ii. 4). Even the directions for the control of the gifts in I. Corinthians xii. to xiv. show plainly that such rules were the custom among "all the churches of the saints," and that they expected them to continue until prophecies, knowledge, and all partial things had been done away by the coming of that which is perfect. If we may say so, not the history of nations, nor communities, nor churches can be said to fulfil that word "perfect," therefore both tongues and prophecy—as well as Christian love—are as necessary to-day as at any period of Church history. If the multitudes are to be brought to Christ, the message needs confirming with signs following.

That manifestations have followed revival right down the Christian dispensation is quite capable of proof (the reader will find a chapter on the subject in Principal George Jeffreys' book, Pentecostal Rays), but of late years, since the growth of the awe-inspiring word "Psychology," many have taken in hand to explain all spiritual manifestations by the application of its magic formulæ. Indeed one writer in the book Christianity and Psychology says, "Any religion can make people 'speak with tongues." The Irving movement of the eighteenth century is described as "a crack in the earth through which the pent-up vapours gushed," and it is said that "it was the result of the repression of spiritual energy, and broke out in hysteria, glossolalia, and prophecy" (Edward Irving and His Circle, by A. L. Drummond). Wesley's revival comes in for like condemnation as due to " the failure of nerve, loss of self-confidence, diseased introspection, and a pathological reaction from the 'splendid sanity ' of the eighteenth century " (Professor J. B. Bary). One writer summing up says, "It is difficult to believe that the Holy Spirit deliberately chooses as His field of operations the slime of the subliminal, the lower mystical marshlands of the human spirit, while avoiding the sunlit hills of full rational consciousness." These are hard words and

IF THEY ARE TRUE

should make us avoid what one writer calls "The Gospel of Credulity," as we would the plague. Even Stanley Jones has some hard things to say about Pentecost in his book *The Christ of Every Road*, for he writes, "The queer have 'queered' Pentecost for us. So much so that one is tempted to leave out the word altogether. . . . Rampant emotionalism has often been identified with Pentecost."

All these statements made me consider very closely what people call "my Pentecostal experience," and I asked myself, "What is it worth? What does it do?" Surely that is what Paul desired when he wrote in I. Thessalonians v., "Quench not the Spirit, despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good." As I thus questioned many experiences in my life, since I received the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, came as fresh to my memory as the day they happened, and my heart was filled with praise to God for Pentecost with signs following. They were not morbid experiences leaving me in the marshlands, as some of these psychologists suggest, but they brought me to sunlit hills of worship, to confirmed faith in the Lord Jesus: best of all, they resulted in a love for His Word that has carried me through the years. In fact, they brought me back to the Lord when, during

the years of Army life, spiritual things were allowed to


The more I thought about these matters, which have never been put in print, the more my heart was moved at the thought that many dear children of God in this glorious experience of Pentecost must have other testimonies-apart from healing-which

SHOULD BE KNOWN

by the Church. At once a series of testimonies along the line of the practical worth of the gifts of the Spirit,

suggested itself to me. Suppose we call it "I Was There!" and make it a rule that hearsay testimonies should be excluded, and ask all who have experiences which definitely show the value of spiritual gifts to write and send them to the Editor of the Evangel. This present-day testimony to the value of the gifts, just as in the past, may be the means of confirming many who are interested in Pentecost, but just a little afraid of being caught up in something which may be "The Gospel of Credulity" instead of the Gospel of the Grace of God, attested with signs following.

Seven Appeals to the Unsaved

Isaiah liii. 1-8; Luke xvi. 19-31.

PRESENT to the unsaved seven appeals in order that they may accept Christ and receive forgiveness of sins and the gift of eternal life.

1. The appeal of the Atonement of Christ.

The Cross of Christ is the signpost that determines our pathway toward eternal life. "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures" is the essence of the gospel. The atonement avails for and prevails with sinners of all kinds. It is the direct expression of the love of God in Christ. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son" (John iii. 16), has the greatest appeal because of its expression in the atonement of Christ for all men. There is no greater appeal than the shed blood of Christ, "the just for the unjust" dying that sinners might live eternally.

2. The appeal of the Resurrection of Christ.

Christ's bodily resurrection is a cardinal doctrine of Scripture, the Gibraltar of Christian evidences, and assures us of victory over death. The bodily resurrection of Christ appeals because it gives life, assurance of our own resurrection, and that of the entire Church of God.

I appeal to the unsaved, "dead in trespasses and sins," to let Christ give them a spiritual resurrection and then look forward in anticipation of the bodily resurrection. "Christ the firstfruits; then we which are alive at His coming."

3. The appeal of Christ's perfect and sinless character.

I appeal to the sinner on the basis of Christ's sinless, perfect, and spotless character. He "who is holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners, and made higher than the heavens" (Heb. vii. 26).

A man came to Dr. Torrey and said:

" I can't believe!"

- " Whom can't you believe?"
- "I can't believe, I tell you!"
- "Whom can't you believe?"
- ".Well, now I see it. I guess I can't believe Christ."
- "Why not? Has He ever done anything unworthy of confidence?"
- "I see now what you mean. I should not doubt so holy and good a Being as Christ when He promises to save me if I believe."

The man accepted Christ and was saved by faith in

but none could give any reason against Christ Himself.

But merely to admire, approve, and appreciate the beauty of Christ's moral character will not save anyone. Millions do that and keep on sinning and walking in darkness. But Christ's unique and perfect character creates faith, and confidence, and leads men to repentance when once they behold their sin and God's Son as their Saviour.

- 4. The appeal of sins committed and the judgment for sin.
- "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. iii. 23). "There is none righteous, no, not one." You need Christ because you are a sinner and cannot save yourself. Your sinful conscience condemns you. It burns like fire. "The wages of sin is death."

Dr. Joseph Cook, of Boston, speaking in 1893, at the World's Fair, challenged all foreign religions to present one remedy for sin. There was no reply except his own: "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin" (I. John i. 7).

Our sins haunt us, paralyse our spiritual sensibilities, and turn us from God and Christ into the eternal night of darkest hell!

It took four nurses and two doctors to hold a dying gangster in bed. His sins caused him terror when he saw the judgment coming before his vision.

- 5. The appeal of Christ's ability to save to the utter-
- "Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them" (Heb. vii. 25). Christ is able to save and able to keep us in salvation for ever. Christ underwrote the world's sins when He died on Calvary's Cross and is therefore able to pay every sinful debt. He can raise from lowest depths of sin to heights of glory. There is no sinner too great for Him to save.

Christ saved Augustine, Martin Luther, Jerry McAuley, Billy Sunday, and a host of others, who became great leaders and workers for God. "This is a faithful saying... that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief" (I. Tim. i. 15). Trust Jesus now and see Him work in your heart and life uttermost salvation!

6. The appeal of Christianity to the world.

Christ is the source and founder of Christianity. Through Him and His followers we have received a Bible, a Saviour, a love, a God, a Father, an abiding hope, an everlasting life, a salvation from sin, a redemption from guilt, a deliverance from corruption, a glorification from all mortal ills, and a home in heaven eternally. No other religion can give anything like that! Show me a Saviour who loved unto death, lived sinlessly, prayed prevailingly, healed miraculously, cast out devils, wrought righteousness, raised the dead, and saved souls, even as Christ did! There is none other.

Christianity appeals to the reason of man, to highest moral ideals, to sinners and saints alike. It appeals because of the sin it forgives, the habits it conquers, the diseases it heals, the redemption it brings, the hope eternal it inspires, the joy and peace it gives, the everlasting life it bestows, the lives it transforms, and the victory it wins!

Christianity has an appeal unto mankind because of its record for 1,900 years in a world of hostility. Amidst its millions it has moulded the destinies of nations. Christ in Christianity has changed nations, dethroned wrong, exalted righteousness, and given holiness to the most vile. For 1,900 years Christianity has proved itself in all these.

7. The appeal of the love of God.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John iii. 16).

Many sinners, like the rich man in the parable (Luke xvi.), reject God's love, and later seek solace when too

late, in hell's torments! God is not pleased at the death of any man, but man sends himself to hell by his own rejection of Christ.

Christ's death and resurrection prove God's love and purpose in redeeming mankind and His willingness to save all who come unto Him. The hardest thing to do is to go to hell over God's love, over a risen Saviour, over evidences of Christianity, over parental pleadings, over a mother's tears and a wife's prayers. Oh, soul without Christ, do not reject the wooing voice of the Holy Spirit and an awakened conscience!

How can your heart rebel against a God of love? How can you reject all these appeals? Will you not accept Him just now as your Saviour from all sin? Cease bartering your soul away for a mess of worldly pleasure which is but for to-day! Come to Christ just now while His Spirit in love pleads with your soul!

Have you counted the cost, if your soul should be lost, Though you gain the whole world for your own? Even now it may be that the line you have crossed; Have you counted—have you counted the cost?

Mirror of World Events

By Pastor P. N. CORRY

Protestants Dying Out in Eire.

The analysis of the census figures for Eire published in Dublin contains information which should make every believer in true religion get to his or her knees. In the period 1926 to 1936 the number of Roman Catholics increased by 22,651, or by 0.8 per cent., and the number of "all other religions" declined by 26,223, or by 11.9 per cent.

The number of members of the Church of Ireland in the twenty-six counties fell by 19,185, or 11.7 per cent.; the number of Presbyterians by 4,362, or 13.5 per cent., and the number of Methodists by 1,104, or 9.5 per cent. Since the beginning of the century the number of persons in "all other religions" has been almost halved.

The following table shows how membership of (1) the Church of Ireland; (2) the Presbyterian Church, and (3) the Methodist Church declined in Eire since 1901:

Since 1926 the number of persons other than Roman Catholics in Dublin City and County decreased by 4,011, or 5.6 per cent., compared with an increase in the number of Roman Catholics of 85,282, or 19.6 per cent. The decline in the number of persons other than Roman Catholics was general throughout the country, but a particularly heavy fall of 8,509, or 15.6 per cent., occurred in Cavan, Monaghan, and Donegal.

We need to pray that there may be a revival of true evangelical religion in Southern Ireland, for we believe many are longing for the truth. A Roman Catholic in Southern Ireland a few years ago, said to me: "There is a need and it is time for a revival of the Gospel message in Ireland." These figures show how true were those words.

Spiritism and the Courts,

Once again the Institute of Magicians have demonstrated that they can reproduce the performance of a spiritist medium with such realism that even spiritists acclaimed their "wonderful mediumship." The case came before the High Court recently, and the professional magicians were awarded the verdict and damages against the spiritist press.

In September, 1937, twenty members of the Institute of Magicians were invited to see a performance by a medium, who purported to be able to read, while blindfold, the contents of sealed envelopes, and to give messages from the dead.

As a result the members of the Institute came to the conclusion that all that the medium did could be done by what conjurers called trickery, and that the medium, though a magnificent showman, was a fraud in claiming mediumistic powers.

A challenge was issued and accepted, and as a result the performance was a complete success, one medium who was present saying that he came to the conclusion that the professional magician possessed mediumistic powers. He wrote a letter saying he saw three Chinese guides at her performance and a bluish light, and that she was under control by an Egyptian named Haifa Pasha.

-Yet, though the fraud has been exposed, Spiritists flourish and the warning of Deuteronomy xviii. 9-14 is ignored. All who seek to the dead are an abomination to the Lord!

Wilson, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, startled his congregation recently by declaring that the world to-day is "full of Christians lazily absorbing spiritual satisfaction and consistently sponging on God." "We have," he said, "people who are worshipping an indulgent deity, who is too good-natured even to reprove them, and they become self-centred and self-satisfied."

Spiritual dissatisfaction as Paul knew it (Phil. iii. 12-15) was the hallmark of full growth. Are you suffering from Christian




